Handicapped by a sea of mud which slackened the speed of both teams, Lincoln high defeated South high at Creighton field yesterday afternoon by the score of 9 to 3. The game marked the opening of the grid season in Omaha.

The large crowd, gathered in defiance of the clouds which threatened to deluge them at any moment witnessed a tight, hard-fought game, which was either team's until the final whistle put an end to the hopes of the local eleven.

Both teams were within striking distance of the goal on numerous occasions, but the ability of the Capital City leads to the necessary final punch at the right time enabled them to score where the locals failed under like circumstances.

The first quarter was about even, with both teams advancing to within striking distance of the goal, only to lose the ball on downs. The Lincolnites took advantage of a bad situation in the second frame, however, when, after three unsuccessful attempts to plow through the South line for a touchdown failed, Jug Brown dropped back and booted a perfect dropkick in spite of the several pounds of mud on his toe and the ball. Only Touchdown in Third.
