

Detectives in "Framed" Holdup Plot Lose Rank

Killion and Davis Should Have Made Arrests on Learning of Robbery Plans, Butler Says.

On recommendation of Police Commissioner Dan Butler, Detectives Frank J. Killion, 33, and William Davis, 27, were demoted yesterday for their alleged participation in the "framing" of the holdup of the Sterling grocery, 1951 St. Mary avenue, Tuesday.

Two of the youths, said to have tipped off the holdup, were released by detectives while their four comrades were arrested and turned over to juvenile authorities.

In his letter to Chief of Police Dillon, requesting the demotion of the two officers, Commissioner Butler declared the detectives should have made the arrest as soon as they knew the plans for the holdup.

Killion joined the police department June 14, 1921, and became a detective April 10, 1922. He shot Joe Manning, alleged holdup, and was wounded by Ben Fillo, alleged promoter. He is an ex-service man.

Davis joined the department in December 1, 1921, and was made a detective May 1, 1922. He has been instrumental in the arrest of four accused murderers.

Demotion of both detectives is effective immediately. Detective Killion, when informed of his demotion, said he would not carry the matter to the city council.

"He's the boss," he observed, referring to Commissioner Butler. "I did what I thought was right, and I suppose he did the same thing. I think Davis will say the same thing."

Crawford Valley lost and so gave the victors a treat on the church lawn, serving fried chicken, ice cream and watermelon.

Loup City, Neb., Sept. 28.—The Sherman county fair, which is being held here this week, is drawing an attendance which exceeds all expectations.

Several new buildings have been erected this season. The race track has been enlarged to half mile and an electric transmission line to the grounds has been built.
