Europe Is Busy **Feeding Itself**

Relief Worker Says Europeans Have No Time for Culture.

That Europe can feed itself, but has no time or money for culture, that the Russian intellectual is the most delightful person in the world, nd that Russian bolshevism is gradually transforming itself into democratic form of government are a few of the impressions brought home from two years of relief work by Miss Iortense Breckler.

Miss Breckler is in Omaha in the nterest of the Jewish theological seminary of New York City, which s now campaigning for an \$1,000,000

ndowment. For two years Miss Breckler tour d Europe, organizing local commit ees to take care of Jewish war orhans for whom American Jews proided money to feed.

"All through these countries, which sed to be the center of culture and earning for Jewish people, I found he struggle for food and shelter absorbed the energies of the people. Their schools, their art, their learnng, were all falling into decay.

"Europe is nearly able to feed and lothe herself now, although we shall have to keep up our work for was orphans until at least 1926.

"The most charming people I have ever met were the Russian and Austrian intelligensia. Delightful, easygoing people, used to luxury but earing their misfortunes gracefully.

"It was from refugees in central bolsheviki, that I got my impression of the changes in Russian bolshev ism. These people believe that bolshevism is gradually transforming itself into a firm and democratic government.

"Most of them look forward to an early return to their homes. While I was in Russia the government was too new, the people too unaccustomed to it, and conditions too chaotic for stranger to get much impression of whither it is all tending."


