

Love Doctor, Not Paid, Kins Nurse

Young Woman Refuses to Pay \$395 for "Love Charm" - Head Crushed.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 8.—Miss Ellis Barthol, 28-year-old nurse, was killed by Lorenzo Savage, voodoo doctor, when she refused to give him \$395 for "curing her love life," according to a confession which city detectives said the man made early today. The confession, according to Captain of Detectives Louis Leff, was made after Savage was taken to the scene of the crime shortly after 10 o'clock.

Under the glare of automobile headlights, Captain Leff said Savage reenacted his movements when he met the nurse beneath the portico of a deserted East End mansion. The man confessed, Captain Leff said, that he struck the nurse in the face when she dropped the money out of his hands; felled her with a brick and then dropped a 70-pound block of marble on her head. As she fell, Miss Barthol cried, "I'll give it to you," Savage is said to have told the detectives, but the man stepped to the outside of the portico and pushed the loose marble block from the wall, crushing her head.

Details of the confession made public by Captain Leff recited how Miss Barthol met Savage while they were employed by an East End physician, the woman as a nurse and the man as a butler. The nurse learned of Savage's ability to "fortune tell" and approached him when she had difficulties with her sweetheart. Savage gave her six cards, led together by a black pin and told her the "charm" would work if she returned the cards to him and paid him \$395 on Saturday night.

They met under the portico late that night and Miss Barthol handed Savage the cards and an envelope containing the money. When Savage announced that "the cure" had worked, the nurse grabbed the money from his hand. Then followed the killing. Savage picked up the money, but in his haste he dropped the blood-marked cards. It was these cards that led the police to arrest him. In his home, they said they found a deck of cards with six missing. The cards found near the body completed the deck, Captain Leff declared.
