An interesting discovery was several articles made of native copper, which originally came from the Great Lakes region, taken from two of the mounds and about 20 heads found around the heck of one skeleton. The copper had been hammered with a stone into thin strips, cut into small sheets and rolled into beads."

Another interesting event, according to Prof. Over, was meeting Samuel T. Brown, sr., an educated quarterbreed, 80 years old, and for whom the valley and town of Brown's Valley, Minn., was named.




