

Trade Routes to Be Consolidated

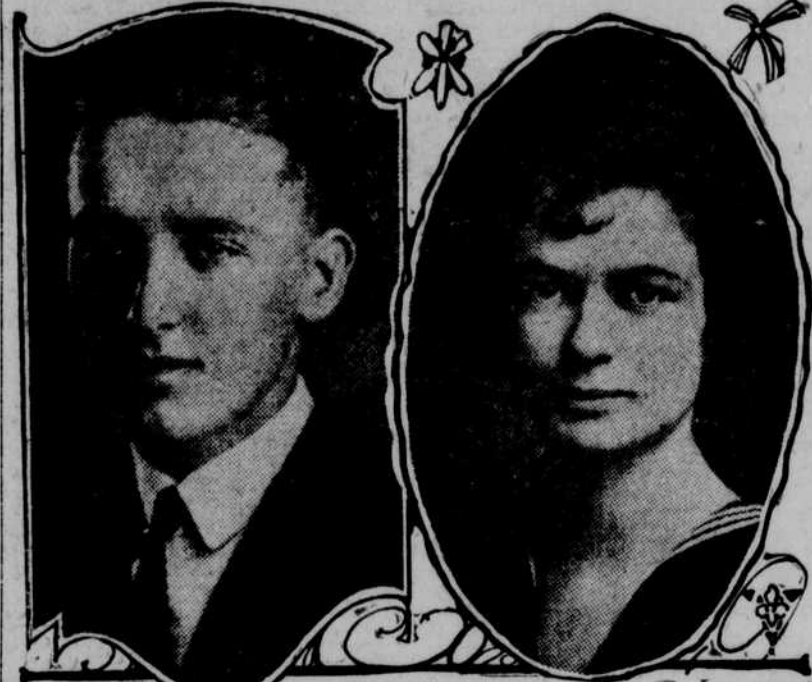
Shipping Board's Action Makes U. S. Lines Subsidiary to Emergency Fleet.

Washington, Oct. 17.—Decision to consolidate the five active North Atlantic-United Kingdom trade routes and to eliminate entirely the managing agent system now in use upon them was announced yesterday by the shipping board.

The place of the agents will be taken by one or more "loading agents" and supervision of the ships will be taken over directly by the board.

A. J. Love has resigned as general manager of the Emergency Fleet corporation to become general manager of the new organization, and T. H. Rossbottom, also connected with the fleet corporation, is expected to be transferred.

'Bus Queen' Trial Nearing Close

Town Marshal Tells of Girl's Insult to Mayor When Arrested.

Waterloo, Ia., Oct. 17.—Final argument to the jury by attorneys for Miss Helen Schultz, 24, owner of the Red Ball Transportation company, had been begun when court adjourned Tuesday after hearing Miss Schultz's suit for \$5,000 each against A. H. Refshauge, former mayor of Cedar Falls, Ia., and Nathan Enlow, city marshal of Cedar Falls, alleging false arrest and imprisonment.

The marshal testified that he arrested Miss Schultz for insulting the mayor in his office and for stating her intention of operating her bus line in defiance of the mayor's order.

After leaving the mayor's office, witness testified that the marshal followed and seized her arm. She resisted the marshal by hitting him with her hand, but was overpowered and taken back to the mayor's office and detained, witness said.

The suits grew out of legal attacks by six railroads and interurban lines before the interstate commerce commission, seeking to restrain her from operating her bus line in competition with the railroads and interurbans.

The railroad companies claimed that the bus competition was destroying their traffic in the region where the busses were operated. The bus routes radiate from Mason City and the company maintains the largest fleet of busses in Iowa.

Farmers of Albion Are Shipping Out Old Corn

Albion, Neb., Oct. 17.—While most of the corn grown in this vicinity is fed to livestock, 2 cars of old corn has been shipped from this point in the last 30 days. This is close to 50,000 bushels and has brought to the farmers approximately \$40,000. There is still considerable corn yet to be sold.

Will Try to Prevent Rush.

Washington, Oct. 17.—Efforts to prevent the recurring monthly rush of emigrant transports to American ports will be made by Chairman Farley of the shipping board at the forthcoming transatlantic passenger conference in London, it was announced yesterday. Mr. Farley will sail from New York Saturday on the Leviathan.

The entire company, 15 players, were on the train, but were minus the most important member of the company, the leading man, Mr. O'Brien. The tour of the company was only half completed when Mr. O'Brien had this exceptionally high offer from Mr. Schenck. The other players are en route to New York City.

Against Violent Methods. Fargo, N. D., Oct. 17.—The agricultural workers' branch of the Industrial Workers of the World, in its 15th annual national convention Tuesday, adopted a resolution requiring every new member to sign a pledge against violence and destruction of property. Instructions were also given the agricultural delegates to the national convention to be held at Chicago, November 12, to push the same resolution for adoption at the national meeting.
