

American Woman Is Fast Becoming Ugly, Declares Biologist

By Associated Press. Topeka, Kan., Oct. 19.—The Ameri-

can woman is rapidly becoming ugly, Albert Edward Wiggam, biologist and publicist of New York, declared in an address prepared for delivery here today before a group of Kansas teachers.

"Our beautiful women soon will cease to exist except in pictures and statuary," Mr. Wiggam asserted. He based his conclusion on the disparity between birth rate among American women of the highest type and that among low-class immigrants.

"There is only one way out," he said. "The old family ideals must be restored. The old American home- stead with its good sized family of well-born children must be rebuilt. The mother must replace the flapper as the national ideal."

Fruit Fresh Indefinitely

Berkeley, Cal., Oct. 19.—Discovery of a new process by which fruit may be kept fresh for an indefinite period is announced by the college of agriculture of the University of California. The fruit is put up in a cold syrup of 29 grams of sugar to each 30 grams of water and sealed by a process in tin cans which preserve the fruit in its natural state, according to Professor A. W. Crocker, credited with devising the method.

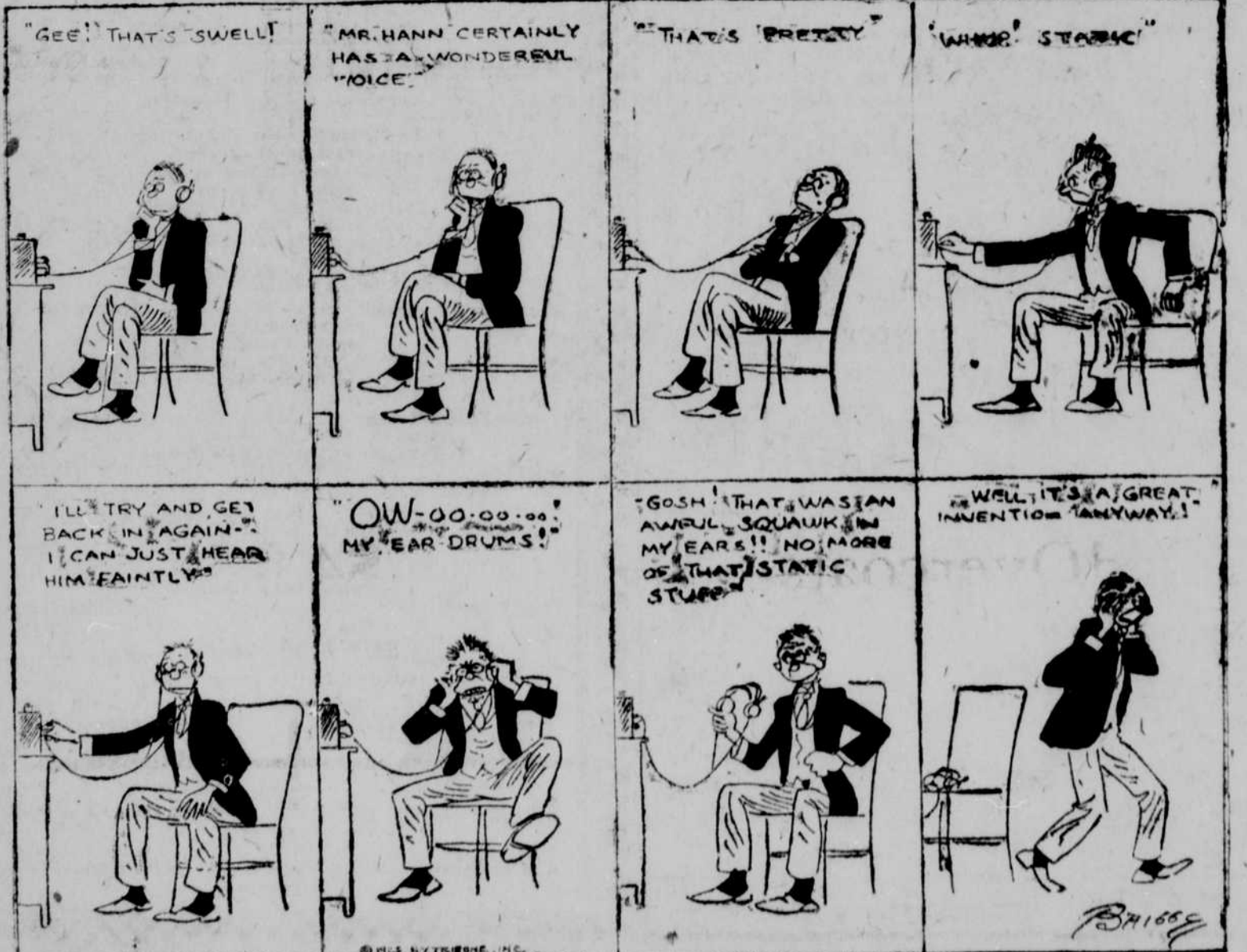
