Missouri Governor, in Omaha, Tells of Schools Construction

Executive Comes Here to Speak to Teachers in Convention.

During the period of two years and eight months, from January 1, 1921, to September 1, 1923, the state of Missouri expended \$19,414,000 for public school construction, this amount being \$2,000,000 in excess of the total for the previous eight years.

This information was given this morning at Hotel Fontenelle by Governor A. M. Hyde of Missouri, who is here to address teachers of District No. 2 of the Nebraska State Teachers' association in the Auditorium.

The governor, who stated that he is 46 years old, carries a loose-leaf reference book filled with statistical information of his state, with particular reference to public schools. His heart is in the school room. During an interview this morning he explained that the increased public school building program in his state was due largely to the assessment of farm and rural real estate at its real value for tax-raising purposes.

Hines on Stand in Bureau Probe

Present Director of Organization Tells of Establishment of New Hospital.

Washington, Oct. 31.—The senatorial investigation of the United States Veterans' bureau which has been concerned for the most part with the activities of former Director Charles R. Forbes, came sharply down to recent events today when Brig. Gen. Frank T. Hines, present director of the bureau, took the stand to tell of expenditures in connection with the establishment of the veterans' hospital at Livermore, Cal.

After testifying that Matthew O'Brien of San Francisco had received \$64,000 from the government for a set of construction plans which were never used, General Hines declared that O'Brien had received a check for an additional \$33,193 from J. L. McCarl, the comptroller general of the United States on October 22, although officials of the veterans' bureau disapproved and opposed the second claim.

Hines charged the comptroller general with violating the rule among government departments in the payment of claims.

Hines said he first learned of the additional payments on October 26, and he immediately wrote the comptroller general a letter demanding an explanation.

Hines testified that O'Brien's contract fixed his compensation at 5 per cent of the cost of construction which was to be limited to \$1,161,000. He further testified that O'Brien's original plans when submitted to contractors was so incorrect that the lowest bid was \$2,174,000, and that the architect was paid in part on the latter sum.

Following Hines on the stand was Col. E. J. Boughton of the veterans' bureau legal staff, who confirmed details of the O'Brien transaction.

Crown Prince Asks Permit to Return to Germany

Doorn, Holland, Oct. 31.—Former Crown Prince Friedrich Wilhelm of Prussia, it is learned authoritatively, has asked permission of the Dutch government to return to Germany. Holland does not object, but would not allow the prince to return again to this country.

According to reliable sources, Friedrich Wilhelm has conferred with the German minister at The Hague in regard to his return.

Convict Cabinet Is in Power at Bonn

Berlin, Oct. 31.—Documentary evidence that a considerable number of the leaders of the separatist movement in the Rhineland are not patriots, but convicts and men convicted of numerous crimes, is given out by government authorities.

Following are some of the criminal records of members of the provisional government at Bonn:

Alex Henderkott, commissioner for churches and schools, by "profession" keeper of a brothel, has been sentenced to prison on 22 different occasions, including four times for swindling, three times for stealing, three times for white slavery, with total sentences amounting to eight years.

Johann Nowak, another commissioner, is a shoemaker, who has served 10 years for manslaughter, six months for stealing and nine months for forgery and blackmail.

Joseph Heymann, chief of police, a waiter, served five years for robbery.

Ferdinand Grohle, commissioner of traffic, has been sentenced 23 times, three times for stealing, three times for forgery, etc.

The commissioner of public art is a trombone player with a record of 13 sentences, while the commissioner of charitable institutions has served six terms in prison.

The government also gives the records of numbers of others.

Suicide Verdict Is Given by Jury

Woman Found on Blazing Cot Took Own Life, Belief.

Fremont, Neb., Oct. 31.—Death by self-inflicted wounds was the verdict made by the coroner's jury after the inquest held over the body of Mrs. Orlaf Nelson, who was found Monday afternoon fully clothed, with her throat cut, lying on a burning bed in the home.

The jury was out 40 minutes. The inquest started at 3 yesterday afternoon and adjourned at 5. The session started again this morning at 10 and reached a decision at 10:45.

An X-ray picture of the body that was taken aided the jurors to reach the decision. It is presumed that Mrs. Nelson stood in front of the dresser mirror and cut her throat with the butcher knife point foremost. The jugular vein was severed which accounts for the blood-spattered mirror and the blood stains on the wall. No clue as to the fire was found, there were no traces of oil or matches in the room. It is believed that Mrs. Nelson set fire to the bed, the matches burning up.

Funeral services for Mrs. Nelson were held this afternoon at the home. Rev. Jean Holmes Dysinger of Swedish Lutheran church of Fremont officiating. Burial was in Ridge cemetery.

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
