Wymore, Neb., Nov. 10.—The Wymore Milling company, which has just completed a \$100,000 hydroelectric plant on the Blue river at Blue Springs, just north of here, to furnish electric current for their mills at Blue Springs and Beatrice, and to sell to outside interests, have started the building of another similar plant on the Blue two miles east of Beatrice. Excavation and foundation work is now in progress.
