## Club Women Take Survey of Persons Who Cannot Read or Write

The education department of the Omaha Woman's club, Mrs. F. Cole, leader, with co-operation of the University of Omaha and public schools, are issuing 20,000 questionnaires this week to determine the number of persons in Omaha who cannot read or write in English. This is being done in connection with Education Week, November 18-24. Five thousand more questionnaires are being placed in industrial plants throughout the city. It is the aim of the department to reach all persons who cannot read or write that they may be helped through the work which is being done in the public schools.
