But there was nothing about the sick room Long List of Civic Improvewhich could make the most optimistic observer believe the little girl is going to get better.

And yet there is a chance. Mrs Hamilton, the widowed mother, has not had money to get specialists. has not had money to get the best medical treatment available, although Dr. W. W. Kain of Camden has given her his services for almost nothing, and Dr. Kain is no mean practitioner.

But the heart specialists, those men who would know, if any human could know, what chance there is for Helen, have been barred to the mother who has led the grim fight. Poverty-and sympathy-do not include the ministrations of famous specialists.

Last night a Philadelphia doctor noted throughout Pennsylvania for his ability to handle heart cases, was ready to go to Camden. If they determine to call him in, he will go to Helen's home to study the case, in consultation with Dr. Kain, That is the one shred of hope now held out for the dying girl.

It is amazing how friendly a cold austere world can be when there is suffering in it. From far off Harrisburg, a nurse experienced through 20 years in a hospital, came to Camden yesterday afternoon and asked to help. Mrs. Hamilton did not tell her "no." She did not accept her services either. There are so many things she can never repay.


