

Liquor Is Found Close to Stadium

Lincoln Officers Declare Town Shall Be Dry During Football Match

By Associated Press. Lincoln, Nov. 23.—Liquor, which officers say was to have been sold as a stimulant to those attending the football game between Syracuse and Nebraska, at the Nebraska memorial stadium tomorrow afternoon, was taken in a raid in a residence directly across the street from the stadium today.

The liquor, 42 pints of moonshine, was confiscated when city, state and county officers arrested five persons, two of them women, and charged them with illegal possession of liquor.

The officers declare that the liquor was imported from Omaha and that it was brought to Lincoln in trucks.

The women, when taken to police headquarters declared that they knew nothing of the approaching gridiron classic and declared they "could sell all they wanted to in Omaha, without coming down here."

Those seeking a little "blitz" to warm them in the weather turns out cold for tomorrow's game will only find recourse through bringing a blanket the dry officers said, adding that backers of the losing team in tomorrow's game will have to look elsewhere for something in which to drown their sorrows.

Kearney Messenger on Bicycle, Hit by Motor

Kearney, Neb., Nov. 23.—Joe Priddy, 17-year-old messenger boy, was severely injured when he was struck by an automobile driven by Leonard Laue. Priddy was homeward bound at the time, riding his wheel. He was knocked to the paving and suffered a compound fracture of the skull. Attending physicians performed an operation, removing bone pressure on the brain and it is stated that the boy has a chance for complete recovery.
