Fail to Form New Berlin Government

Nationalists Block Move of Liberal Named by President Ebert to Succeed Stresemann.

Quit Aiding Ruhr Today

By International News Service. Berlin, Nov. 24.—Eberl, von Kardorf, a "reformed Prussian Junker," who had been designated by President Ebert to form a new government in succession to the Stresemann cabinet, announced tonight he had failed.

After announcing his acceptance to President Ebert, von Kardorf began conferring with party leaders. Soon it was evident he would not be able to construct a new government. Keen opposition developed against him at once.

Von Kardorf was a member of the nationalist party. Now he belongs to the left wing of the German people party and is almost "radical" in the liberality of his political views. He is disliked by the nationalists who charge him with being a political "franchise."

General Von Seekt, commander-in-chief of the rechartered and German military post, has requested the Reichstag to suspend the parliamentary immunity of Nationalist Deputy Grafse so that he can be prosecuted on the charge of high treason.

The failure of President Ebert to designate Heinrich Albert as successor to Stresemann caused some surprise. He had been conspicuously mentioned, however, as the name assigned violent opposition on account of the role he played in the great war.

Plans to Blow Up Other Buildings Revealed—Government on Watch. Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 24.—Three foreigners were arrested here today as suspects in the bombing of the Spanish and Italian consulates here earlier in the day.

Plans of dynamite to blow up the Wanmaker statue and scores of homes in the Philadelphia district are revealed, police believe in an incognito note picked up today near the bombed Italian consulate by Antonio Riccardio, Italian policeman.

Washington, Nov. 24.—Secretary of State Hughes tonight took official cognizance of the bomb attacks made today upon the Spanish and Italian consulates in Philadelphia by calling upon Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania to furnish him complete information of the explosions.
