

# Dry Informer Denies Wooing Accused Woman

No Affair of Heart With Helen Lamb, Delmar Holloway Testifies in Federal Court.

Friendship between a prohibition evidence man and a woman accused of selling liquor was alleged in Judge J. W. Woodrough's courtroom Monday afternoon. The case was that of Helen Lamb, 24, and Edward Kessler, both charged with violation of the national prohibition laws.

The trial was interrupted during the cross-examination of Delmar Holloway, informer for Robert Samardick, general prohibition agent. Holloway admitted that he was "somewhat friendly" with Mrs. Lamb, although he purchased two bottles of evidence liquor of her, besides a number of drinks, at her home, 1516 Cass street.

Holloway denied that he told Mrs. Lamb that if she married him he would see that the charges would be dropped by Samardick. Samardick testified that when he raided the alleged resort, Kessler dumped a coffee pot of corn whiskey.

Mrs. Lamb is to take the witness stand this morning.

**Didn't Know Name.** Holloway testified that he registered with a woman at the Harley hotel as Mr. and Mrs. Jack Shaw and not as Jack Shaw and wife.

"I want to enter a vigorous objection against counsel's examination," shouted Deputy United States District Attorney Keyser.

Lovey finished with a rigid examination. Judge Woodrough stated that he didn't see that it was material, as what the jury desired to know was whether any liquor was purchased.

"Didn't you register with Mrs. Lamb at the Harley hotel, at room 23?" asked Attorney William Lovey for the defendants.

"I did register but not with Mrs. Lamb," replied Holloway.

"Who did you have?" again queried Lovey. "Didn't you walk down the street towards the hotel with her?"

"Yes, I did," said Holloway, "but I did not register with Mrs. Lamb." "Did you shake Mrs. Lamb and get another woman and take her to the hotel?"

"Yes, I did," he said. "And who was she?" "I don't know her name," he said.

**Identified by Clerk.** L. E. Wilson, clerk at the hotel, brought a page of the register and took the stand and identified Holloway and Mrs. Lamb as the couple who registered November 21.

Deputy United States District Attorney Keyser branded as fiction the defense's attempt to connect Holloway with a robbery charge in some other city.

Jesse Cranny and Ray Lones, attorneys who lost their liquor cases just prior to the starting of the Lamb-Kessler trial, and Raymond Coffey, who has several liquor cases, be tried, whispered advice to the defendant's counsel. Prosecutor Keyser called the jury's attention to the intervention of the defeated baristers.
