If Camp wants to get a theoretical trouncing from a good mythical eleven, then The Glutt challenges him to a contest. Each man is to write his all-American selection on a piece of wrapping paper.

There will be 50,000 spectators, two student bands and cheer leader. In fact, this game will be played with everything but football teams.

If, at the end of the game, everybody doesn't admit that The Glutt has the best team on paper, then he will tear up his notes and depend on his memory.

The Glutt has eleven Rufftown stars all picked out. Their names are in the hat. The hat is a brown derby. Camp has been picking teams for twenty years and getting away with it because nobody has had the nerve to outpick him. The Glutt will overlook him.

It will be the first time that two all-American teams ever tried to all-Americanize one another. And it will be the final touch to a collegiate season of small touches.

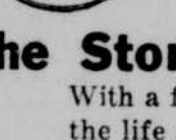
