Coast Farmers Oppose Rate Hike

San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 12.—California grain growers, millers yesterday joined with far western carriers in opposing before an interstate commerce commission field inquiry, contemplated reductions in freight rates on grain.

Basis for the opposition of railroads, growers and wheat brokers against a wheat rate reduction was summed up in the statement of H. W. Klein, assistant general freight agent of the Southern Pacific company, who testified that California did not grow enough wheat to meet its milling and consumption requirements and the freight rate added to the basic price paid for hard Kansas wheat, plus the freight rate to Cal-

ifornia, was a governing factor in the California market price. The present rate, Mr. Klein testified, was fixed to enable Kansas growers to compete with wheat growers in the Pacific northwest who compete in the California market under the advantage of a low water rate from tidewater points at Portland and Seattle.
