

Fargo Rate Case May Aid Shippers

Cost Between Here and North Dakota Town Excessive Is Charge.

Fargo, N. D., Dec. 14.—Omaha shippers may gain important advantages in the matter of freight rates in the American northwest apart from Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth, through the so-called Fargo rate case, in which the findings and recommendations of the special examiner of the interstate commerce commission have just been filed at Washington.

Fargo, through the traffic department of the Fargo Commercial club, assailed the traffic rates from Omaha to Fargo, and points similarly located, charging they are excessive in relation to the rates charged from Omaha to Minneapolis, Duluth and St. Paul.

The interstate commerce commission examiner, A. C. Wilkin, in his report, advises the commission the rates from Omaha, as well as from Kansas City, Mo., and other Missouri river crossings, are excessive in relation to rates from Omaha, Kansas City and other Missouri river crossings, to Minneapolis, St. Paul and Duluth.

In its charge, the Fargo Commercial club recited that the rate from Omaha to Fargo on first-class freight for a haul of 508 miles is \$1.83 1/2, while the rate for the same service from Omaha to Duluth, a haul of 499 miles, is \$1.21 1/2.

This difference in the rates, it was held out, permitted Duluth and Twin City jobbers to obtain an unfair advantage over Fargo jobbers on goods purchased in Omaha and jobbed out to the northwest cities.

Final hearing will be held on January 15, when participants in the case will be permitted to file exceptions to the examiner's report.

Table Rock Man Files Bankruptcy Petition

Table Rock, Neb., Dec. 14.—Clyde Wilson, a farmer living some four miles southwest of Table Rock and owning three farms in the near vicinity, filed a petition in voluntary bankruptcy on Wednesday, listing his debts as \$66,161.56 and his assets at \$65,415. He claimed exemption in the sum of \$1,409. The bulk of the claims against him are secured, Mr. Wilson says, giving this item as \$59,350. The principal creditors are the Lincoln Joint Stock Land bank, \$17,000; the Federal Land bank of Omaha, \$4,500; First State bank of Pawnee City, \$27,800; Mrs. J. C. Wilson of Mount Pleasant, Ia., \$10,000.

Corn Under Flood Waters in September Is Cribbed

Beatrice, Neb., Dec. 14.—D. W. and S. B. Lash, living in the Blue valley southeast of Beatrice, have just finished husking and cribbing 6,300 bushels of corn most of which they will hold during the winter for feeding purposes. Fifteen acres of the crop were under flood waters in September, but this was gathered with a loss of about only five bushels to the acre because the corn stood up well during the flood.

Millions Spent to Send Letter to Nebraska

Beatrice, Neb., Dec. 14.—Victor E. Lang of this city is in receipt of a letter from Edward Nagl, former Beatrice resident who went to Germany some time ago to make his home. Mr. Nagl is in the cigar business at Breslau and says that conditions there are very unsettled. It required about 4,000,000 in German marks to bring the letter to the United States.

Five Badly Burned in Kerosene Explosion

Beatrice, Neb., Dec. 14.—Fire starting from an explosion of kerosene when Clarence Eden started a fire in the cook stove at his home in West Beatrice today, partially destroyed the home and seriously burned Mrs. Eden, her three children, Virginia, Jack and Clarence Eden, and Tom Krug. All were removed to a hospital.

Mitchell Is Bound Over.

Beatrice, Neb., Dec. 14.—Charles Mitchell, Wymore, Neb., arrested at Ottumwa, Ia., for removing mortgaged property from state, was bound over to the district court this evening. He was released on \$500 bond.
