Washington, Dec. 15.—Underhanded attacks on the farm loan system have taken the form of an attempt to prevent confirmation by the senate of M. L. Corey and other members of the board, according to George C. Jewett, general manager of the American Wheat Growers association.

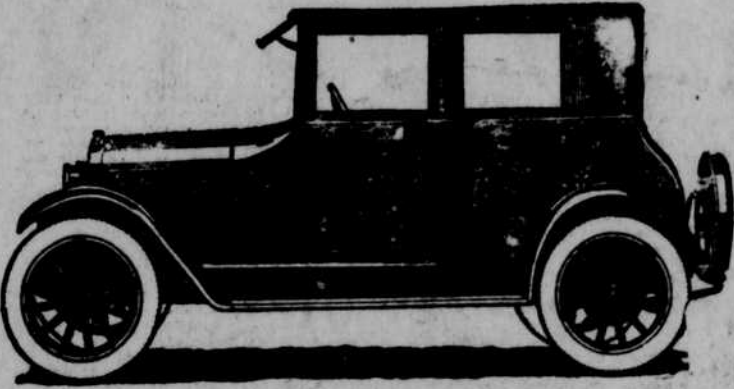
