All those who are affected in the same manner econom ically, should be in the same group politically; but today we find just the reverse to be true. Angel Flores and Raol Madera, brother of the assassinated president, were preparing to launch separate revolts

and Huertista rebels. A civilian rebel army numbering about 8,000 was said to have gathered at the gateway to Mexico City, awaiting orders to seize government arsenals and public bguildings. Mexico City is defended by 2,000 loyal soldiers and their commander, General Gomez, said he would fight to the
