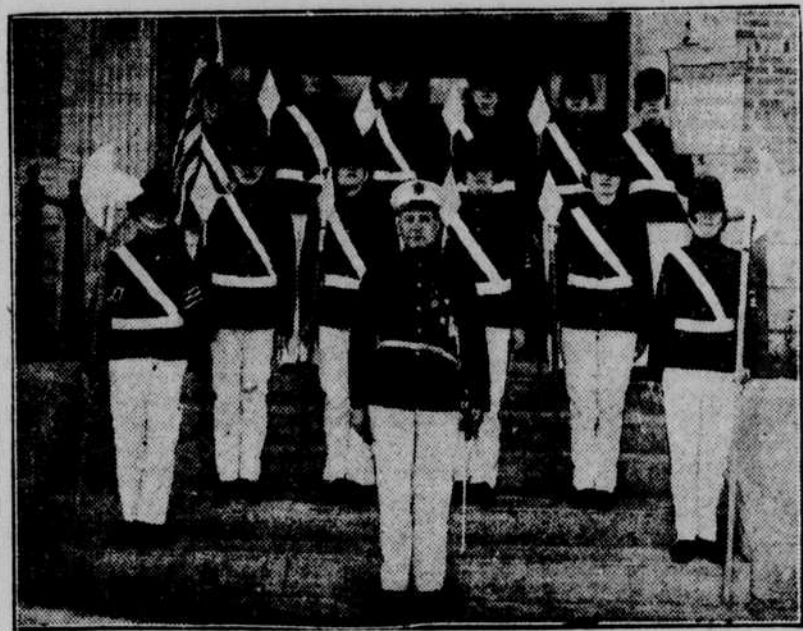
## Democracy in East for Underwood

## Tax Plan to Get Consideration in Congress Before Bonus Bill

The committee declined, however, to sidetrack it until a decision is reached as to what changes should be made in tax rates.
