Jury in Fox Case Recom. mends Clemency in Verdict of Murder of Attorney.

Defendant May Appeal

Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 21 .- "Guilty of

murder, with recommendation for mercy," was the verdict returned tonight against Philip E. Fox, Ku Klux Klan editor, who killed William S. Coburn, klan attorney, in Atlanta,

The verdict, under Georgia laws, provided a life imprisonment sentence. After hearing evidence and arguments for more than a week, the jury received the case late last

At the request of the defense the jury was polled. It was unanimous. Fox stood up. He shook his head in the negative when the judge asked if he desired to say anything.

To Get Life Term. "You shall spend the balance of our natural life in the penitentiary of this state," the judge said.

Fox trembled and his head drooped heavily on his chest. Judge Howard directed the defendant to sit down. Two bailiffs steadied the trembling man as he sank into his chair. The court then cautioned all spectators to remain seated. Twenty or more policemen, headed by Chief of Police Beavers and the bailiffs,

surrounded Fox and he was escorted Relatives Absent. Neither Mrs. Fox nor her 8-yearold son was present when the verdict was read. Mrs. Coburn. widow of the slain man, and her brother,
