Midland College Given \$50,000 for Girls' Dormitory

Fremont, Neb., Dec. 21 .-- Official nnouncement has been made of the nation of \$50,000 to Midland college by Henry C. Lucky, contractor, of Lincoln. The money is to be used in the construction of a girls' dormitory and will be available for Midland's use

Midland is in the midst of a building program and a girls' dormitory was one of most needed buildings. The dormitory will be known as Mr. and Mrs. Henry C. Luckey hall and will adjoin the campus.

Mr. Luckey's connection with Midland college dates back to 1919. He attended a meeting of the representa tives of the institution at Atchison, Kan., when plans for the removal of the school to Fremont were being contemplated. Mr. Luckey was instrumental in bringing Midland to shown a lively interest in its progpresident of the board of trustees.


