

U. S. Sells Arms, Planes, to Obregon

Large Supply of Guns and Ammunition to Be Delivered in 24 Hours.

By Associated Press Washington, Jan. 4.—The United States government has sold 5,000 Enfield rifles, model 1917; 5,000,000 rounds .30 caliber rifle ammunition and eight airplanes to the Obregon government of Mexico.

Secretary Weeks, in a brief statement today, said the terms of the sale called for one-half of the purchase price in cash and one-half within 90 days.

It was explained that the articles named did not include all of those requested on the original lists issued by the Mexican government, but that they would "meet the present requirements."

Orders for the delivery of the munitions, Secretary Weeks said, would go forward within 24 hours.

Arrangements have been made to turn over the ammunition and rifles to Mexican representatives from the San Antonio (Tex.) arsenal and at Fort Bliss, El Paso.

The airplanes will be delivered at the Fairfield (O.) air depot, near Dayton.

This government has sold to the Mexican government, the statement said, "5,000 Enfield rifles, model of 1917; 5,000,000 rounds, caliber .30 ammunition and eight D.H.4 airplanes, the terms of the sale being one-half cash and one-half within 90 days. These articles do not cover the entire list requested originally, but the Mexican government thinks they will answer its present requirements."

TABLE ROCK—The DuBois school board has extended the holiday vacation from one to two weeks. This is done in an effort to stamp out an epidemic of scarlet fever.

TABLE ROCK—A trainload of walnut logs was pulled out of Table Rock and taken to manufacturers of furniture. This load had been picked up between Lincoln and Table Rock. There have been many other walnut logs taken from this section in the past, as well as many carloads which have been shipped out separately. At the rate at which they are being cut, walnut trees will become scarce in this country within a short time.

FALLS CITY—An all-Richardson-county-products dinner will feature the annual banquet of the Falls City chamber of commerce January 9. Every ingredient from "soup to nuts" will be home-grown, with the exception of sugar and coffee.

CALLAWAY—Among the first class cornhusking records which have been reported is one made by Asa Ryan, who husked 108 bushels of corn in one day.

AURORA—Political activity has begun in Hamilton county with the filing by T. M. Scott, mayor of Aurora, for the position of county judge. Mr. Scott has been mayor of Aurora several years and was for several terms a member of the house of the legislature from Hamilton county. Omaha & Council Bluffs Street Railway company was named defendant in a series of three suits, totaling \$100,300, filed by Mrs. Edward H. Thomas, 332 South Twenty-seventh street, and her daughter, Vera May, 15.
