

Former Congressman in Race for Senate Outlines Views on National Problems-No Platform Offered.

Lincoln, Jan. 7 .- Former Congress man Charles H. Sloan of Geneva has accepted the petitions of more than 2,000 voters, recently filed with the secretary of state, to run for the United States senate. With his acceptance he presented a receipt for the filing fee

Sloan is the second republican to file his candidacy, the other being Lieutenant-Governor Fred G. Johnson of Hastings.

The former congressman was a can didate for the senate in 1918, but was defeated by Senator Norris at the primaries.

In 1910, he was elected as a republ can representative from the Fourth Executives and the Nebraska Assocongressional district, and three times re-elected. While in congress, he especially

championed the agricultural interests, and was the author and accredited successful advocate of two measures designed to reduce the northwest farmers' losses; the eradication of hog cholera and eradication of tubercuosis in livestock.
