Col. Charles J. Jordan, 80, picturesque figure of the frontier days of the middlewest, died a week ago in a hospital at Pierre, S. D. It was learned in Omaha Saturday.

He was a cousin of Gen. George A. Custer, and a descendant of Stephen Hopkins, an officer on the Mayflower. He participated in every council of note between northern Indians and the whites, and was known as the "Indians' friend."

For many years he was a government agent on the Rosebud reservation and lived at Orchard ranch, near White, River, S. D. with his full blooded Indian wife. She died a few years ago.

Colonel Jordan had many acquaintances in Omaha, including Mayor James Dahlman and T. C. Hornsby, vice president of the federal land bank here.

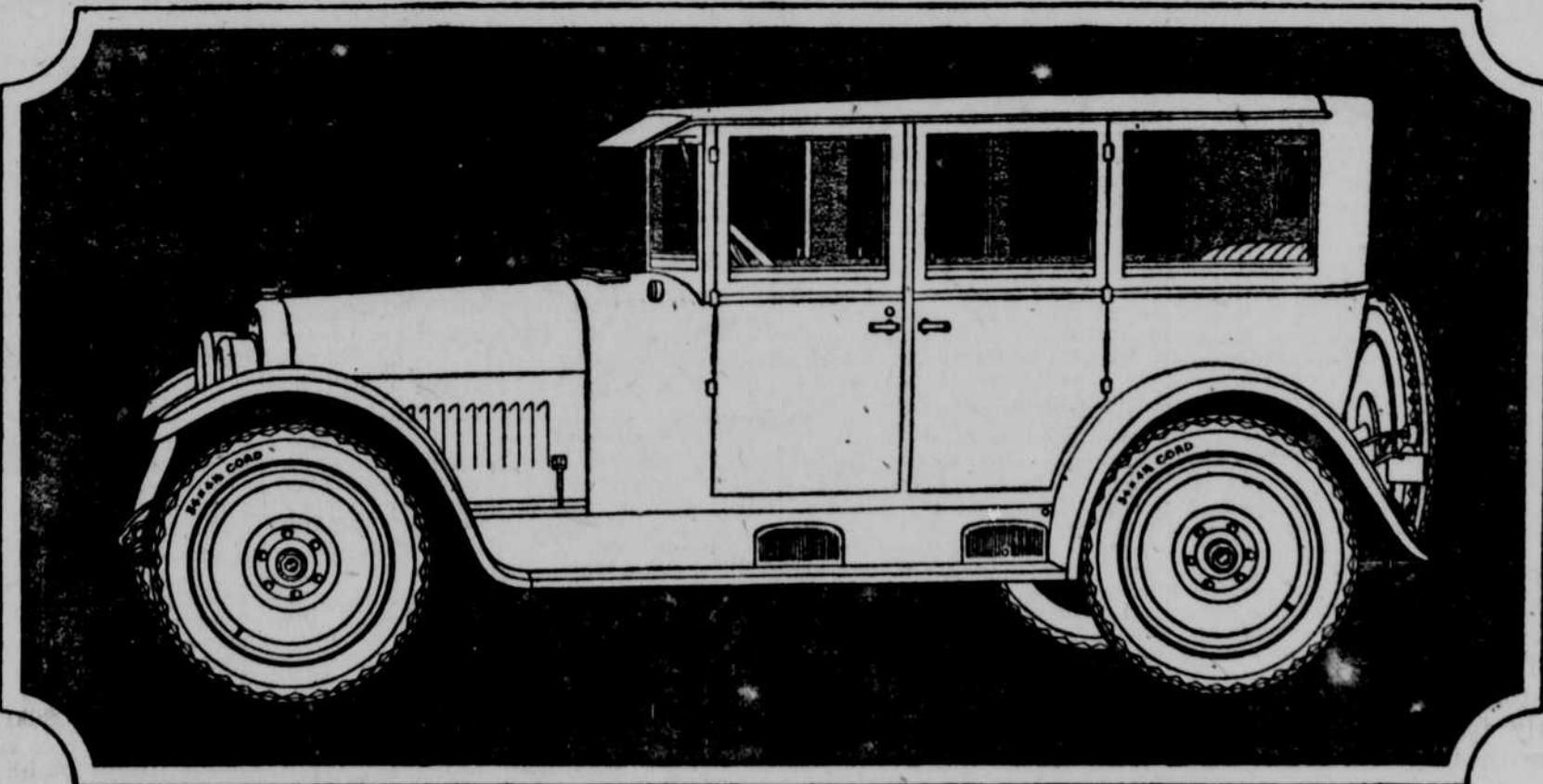
