Republican Women Urged to Seek Delegateships to National Convention — Henry Wallace Talks.

Republican women are going to be seen and heard during the forthcoming campaign in Nebraska. This was indicated at a conference yesterday noon in Hotel Rome, where Mrs. Edgar R. Penny of Fullerton, Neb., was the guest of honor.

Secretary Wallace Present. Henry C. Wallace, secretary of agriculture, was at the meeting for a few minutes. He asserted that the men welcomed the women into the affairs of the party, and he stated his belief that women should share the duties and responsibilities as well as enjoying the privileges.

C. A. McCloud of York, former state chairman and candidate for national committee, sent a telegram in which he explained his inability to attend and expressed the hope that the women republicans of Nebraska will lead off in filing for delegateships to the republican national convention. Nebraska will be entitled to 18 delegates in the next republican national convention, the apportionment in 1920 having been 18. Mr. McCloud wired that the women should file for delegateships and should be represented at the national convention.

Talks Are Brief. The conference had no political significance insofar as particular candidates are concerned at this time. References were made to the Harding administration and to the ability of President Coolidge. It was a get-together meeting, as Mrs. Draper Smith, chairman, explained. Mrs. Smith is vice chairman of the Douglas county republican central committee and member of the state central committee.

Warden Enters Race for Convention Billet

Lincoln, Jan. 15.—William F. Fenton, warden of the state penitentiary, today filed with the secretary of state petitions carrying the necessary number of signatures to place his name on the ballot for delegate to the democratic national convention. Fenton is from the First district.

A primary opponent of Charles W. Pool, democratic secretary of state, appeared today when W. H. McGaffin, Jr., of David City filed his nomination. Judge J. H. Broady of the district court here, who was appointed by Governor Bryan to fill an unexpired term, will be a candidate for reelection and has sent in the check for the required filing fee. Another judicial candidate who stated today that he would file shortly is W. M. Cain of Fremont, who is seeking a place on the supreme bench from the Third district.

Merrick County Mothers' Pension Fund Exhausted

Central City, Neb., Jan. 15.—The mothers' pension fund is exhausted in Merrick county. The state law provides for a levy of one-tenth of a mill for this fund, which provides an approximate total of \$3,100 for Merrick county. The regular monthly claims total \$349, and as a result this fund is in arrears to the extent of \$500. A needy person will be taken care of, however, upon application to the general fund.

Police Lose Claim. Lincoln, Jan. 15.—Lyman Wheeler, representing the Omaha police department in an action to force the city to refund money paid for their surety bonds by police officers, lost his appeal, totalling \$8,540, before the Nebraska supreme court today.

What Will Omaha Be in 1950?

The marvelous growth and development of Omaha in the past has been due to her ideal geographical location, excellent railroad facilities, productive trade territory and progressive business spirit.

What are the factors which will cause Omaha to become a vastly greater city? Omaha's trade territory now embraces nearly 5,000,000 people and is growing steadily and will continue to grow.

In this territory there is yet an average of only 13 people per square mile, while for the United States as a whole the average is 35. The value of the per capita crop production in the United States for the last 10 years has been \$81, while that of Omaha's trade territory has been \$205.

Omaha is the "hub" of 60,000 miles of railway lines consisting of 10 trunk lines and 22 branches. Our city is the country's fourth railroad center, the gateway to an immense and wealthy empire in the heart of the corn belt.

Our city has 32 banks and trust companies and is the financial and industrial center of the Middle West.

As Omaha grows, the need for telephone service will continue and require vast sums of money from investors to supply buildings, switchboards, wires, cables, telephones and other supplies and equipment.

In order to meet future telephone requirements satisfactorily, we must anticipate the needs years in advance and have the necessary equipment and trained organization ready when service is required.

Planning for future needs by obtaining money from investors to build additional facilities, and selecting and training an organization, are some of the very important things necessary to furnish reliable service at the lowest possible cost to the public.

It should be our great honor and privilege to make Cleveland a home for all of us. It is time to quit regarding municipal government as a corporation of which citizens are stockholders—who incidentally have never received any dividends. One of the things most unworthy of the country today is our lack of interest in city government.
