Columbus, Neb., Jan. 18/ - Ernest Michaelson narrowly escaped death today when the explosion of the 250pound compressed air tanks wrecked a machine shed at rear of the Motor Inn filing station, shattered the station windows and those of adjoining buildings, causing an estimated property damage of \$1,000 and scattering debris 100 feet in every- direction. Michaelson, driver for the station, :-: was just 30 seconds too late in getting around the building into the shed.

The explosion was caused by stop cocks freezing shut on the tanks, an add feature being that the explosion occurred at the same time.
