Thousands Pay Last Tribute to Senator Allen

Friends, Comrades and Associates From Many States Through Line of March to Last Resting Place.

Madison, Neb., Jan. 18.—Along the flag draped streets of the city where he had lived, and died, for 40 years, followed by the largest cortege that ever assembled in Madison county to pay tribute to a beloved citizen and neighbor, the body of William Vincent Allen was carried to the cemetery today.

The activities of the entire county were practically at a standstill during the hours of the funeral service. Men of all walks of life, assembled from all sections of Nebraska, Wyoming, Iowa and far-off California to pay tribute to the memory of the distinguished statesman and jurist.

Michaelson, driver for the station, was just 30 seconds too late in getting around the building into the shed.
