According to Associated Press dis patches, Consul Corrigan boarded the Majestic on its arrival at Cherbourg from New York. He found Mr. Bos sie and informed him of his instruc tions from the State department.

Bossie, thereupon, showed the con sul a marriage certificate dated Omaha, December 21, stating that he had married Miss Emma M. Wamsley of Redlands, Cal., and stated that the woman with him was the same.

Whereupon the consul evidently apologized for intruding and allowed the pair to land without further ado And he sent a report to the State department, the dispatch adds, ex plaining that it was all a mistake and that whoever notified the depart ment to have the pair stopped was evidently unaware that Bossie was divorced six months ago and had a


