Fruit Recipes

Orange and Apple Salad.

Better even than the popular Waldorf salad is the combination of oranges and apples. In using oranges for salads always select navel oranges as they have no seeds and are much easier to prepare as well as more decorative. A navel orange carefully peeled and sliced with a very sharp knife gives perfect slices.

For the orange and apple salad slice four oranges and one apple which has just been cored, peeled and sliced into thin slices. Squeeze a little orange or lemon juice over the apples as soon as they are sliced to prevent discoloring. Serve on crisp lettuce or watercress with French dressing.

Golden Salad Dressing.

One-quarter cup pineapple juice, 1/4 cup California orange juice, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 egg yolks, 1-3 cup sugar, 2 egg whites.

Mix pineapple juice, orange and lemon juice and salt and beat in double boiler. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored, gradually
