### Lincoln Driven by Conscience to Reveal Murders

#### Makes Clean Breast of Killing Wife and Her Brother and Imbedding Heads in Cement Block.

Aurora, Ill., Jan. 26.—Edgar Allen Poe's "Tell Tale Heart" found a modern rival here tonight in the sudden unravelling of a mystery that for a year had defied solution.

Warren J. Lincoln, horticulturist, poet and self-styled relative of Abraham Lincoln, dramatically confessed to the murder of his wife, Lina Shoup Lincoln, and her brother, Byron Shoup, and unerringly led Chief of Police Michels to a dump near his little cottage, where he pointed to a cement block. Broken open, this block revealed the bodies of the two murder victims.

"I couldn't stand it," Lincoln said. "I couldn't continue to believe that the cement block would forever hold my secret. I had to tell."

After the stone was chipped away from the heads, Lincoln said he was ready to tell how he committed the crime and, according to the chief of police, said:

"I went to a movie that night. When I came home Byron was not in his bed on the sleeping porch. I knew I would find him in my wife's bedroom and I did. I shot him dead."

"Then I ran to the greenhouse and got my rifle. When I got back, Lina was on the floor crying. I shot her too."

The block of cement he placed under the front porch of his little home to act as a support.

"Last July," he said, "I threw it on the dump."

The heads were easily identified, according to Chief Michels. The features of the two victims were distinguishable. The other skin had been destroyed and Mrs. Lincoln's hair was closely intertwined in the mass of cement.

According to the first reported confession, Lincoln dismembered the bodies and buried them in the greenhouse furnace.

The discovery and identification of the heads provides the corpus delicti, which until now has caused doubt as to whether Lincoln could be prosecuted, even though he had confessed.

State's Attorney J. Bruce Amell announced the state would fight for the death penalty for Lincoln.

### Obregon to Lead Army From Train

El Paso, Tex., Jan. 26.—Oaxaca, capital of the state of that name, and a strongly fortified position, is being attacked upon three sides by federal troops under the direction of General E. Madrigal, military officials in Juarez were advised today. The city is being defended by the troops of General Garcia Vigil.

President Alvaro Obregon has abandoned his plan to direct an offensive against the rebel troops of the field against rebels in Michoacan and Jalisco, Juarez was officially advised today. The chief executive is at the head of 30,000 men. He left his temporary military headquarters at Celaya early today and is prepared to sweep everything before him by sheer weight of numbers, it is reported.

Passengers arriving from the south declare that never before in the history of Mexico has such a great force of men been assembled as that now under the command of the president. All troops are well equipped and their morale is high, it is said.

### Harrison Heads Iowa Press Body for Coming Year

#### Ottumwa Courier and Storm Lake Pilot Tribune Win Cups for Service to Communities.

Des Moines, Ia., Jan. 26.—E. P. Harrison of the Ottumwa Courier was advanced from vice president to president of the Iowa Press association for the coming year at the closing session of the annual convention here today. Harrison is a member of the state legislature.

K. P. Balridge of the Bloomfield Democrat was elected vice president. O. E. Hull of the Leon Reporter was re-elected recording secretary, and R. G. Ray of the Grinnell Herald, treasurer.

The Press association delegates passed a resolution commending the daily newspapers of the state for the steps they have taken to advertise Iowa as a market. Another resolution states that the newspapers of Iowa donated space to the value of \$300,000 during the last year to further the progress of agriculture.

The Ottumwa Courier was awarded the cup offered by the Ames chapter of Sigma Delta Chi for the newspaper rendering the most conspicuous community service during 1923.

The Courier, of which W. H. Powell is editor, was given the cup in recognition of its diamond jubilee edition last fall. This edition of 216 pages was especially commended by the delegates for the volume of historical and community service news.

The Mason City Globe Gazette, the Waterloo Courier and the Fort Dodge Messenger received honorable mention.

Weekly Paper Award.

The Storm Lake Pilot Tribune, of which W. G. Jarnagin is editor, was awarded the cup offered by Sigma Delta Chi for the weekly newspaper for community service.

The Cherokee Chief and the West Union Argo Gazette received honorable mention.

The Waverly Democrat was awarded the Des Moines Register and Tribune cup for the best makeup of newspapers in towns of over 1,000 population, and the Golden Graphic received the cup for the best makeup of newspapers in towns of under 1,000.

### Rates Slashed on Nebraska Grain

#### Twenty-four Burlington and Missouri Pacific Points Affected by Tariff Revision.

Lincoln, Jan. 26.—Revised freight rates on corn and wheat between 24 Nebraska shipping points and St. Louis, Chicago and Peoria, were reduced by the state railway commission. With two exceptions, where the rates remain the same, the revision is downward and varies from half a cent to five cents.

The Burlington has already prepared new tariffs which include the revised rates, according to Commissioner Brown, and the Missouri Pacific has accordingly changed its rates. No other roads are affected by the changes.

### Part of Schoellkopf Jewels Found in Jar

New York, Jan. 26.—Police Inspector John D. Coughlin announced tonight that \$86,200 of the \$300,000 worth of jewels stolen from Mrs. C. P. Hugo Schoellkopf of Buffalo, on New Year's eve, 1922, were found this week in a sealed fruit jar.

Detective Martin Owens of Inspector Coughlin's staff, was led to the cache in Denver by John W. Mahan, former Broadway gem dealer, who is now under \$100,000 bail on an indictment for criminally receiving the stolen jewels. Mahan's confession, Inspector Coughlin stated, cleared all details of the robbery.

### Omaha Singer Dies in East of Sleeping Sickness

Ethel Solomon, Omaha singer, died yesterday at Jamestown, N. Y., according to word received here as the result of sleeping sickness. She was on tour with a musical company playing "The Gown Shop."

Her sister, Genevieve, and her mother, Mrs. J. J. Solomon, of Cleveland, O., were with her at the time of her death. Miss Solomon was the daughter of the late Dr. J. J. Solomon of Omaha for burial.

### Freed by One Judge, Arrested by Another

Hans Norsgaard, Sarpy county farmer, has escaped from the predicament in which he found himself when one judge released him from county jail and another ordered his return to jail.

Norsgaard was released by the jailer on January 5. The jailer said the federal judge signed the order releasing Norsgaard, so as to enable Norsgaard to attend to his farm work. Norsgaard was in jail for a liquor law violation. But in the meantime he had been fined \$25 for reckless driving, and had appealed to district court, putting up a bond for his appearance there.

District Judge Day, who hears these appeal cases, learned that the property securing Norsgaard's bond was in Sarpy rather than in Douglas county. So he promptly ordered Sheriff Endres to get Norsgaard and put him back in the jail house. Norsgaard appeared yesterday at the courthouse and paid the \$25 speeding fine, however, and Judge Day now ordered the sheriff he was no longer interested in the man.

### Child's Shin Bones Removed; Waits for New Ones to Grow

Shin bones in both the legs of Marlon Sledge, 3, granddaughter of Mrs. Martha Sledge, 2719 South Twentieth street, have been removed at University hospital, and the child is now in a hospital bed, waiting for new bones to grow.

Due to an infection, it became necessary to remove the bones from the protecting membrane. Thin strips of fat, cut from the patient's thigh were inserted in place of the bones and the wound was closed. Doctors say that the bones will grow again.
