Iowa Committee Backs Coolidge

State Central Body Sets Convention Date for March 4.

Des Moines, Ia., Jan. 26 .- A resolution endorsing President Coolidge for republican presidential nomination was adopted here Friday by the Iowa state central committee, which met to fix a date for the state convention at which a delegation to the Cleveland convention will be selected. The delegate convention was set for March 4. State Chairman B. B. Burnquist of Fort Indge was instructed to send out the call to county chairmen within a few days. The basis of representation at the delegate convention will be the same as for the last state convention based upon the vote cast at the last election of Govmor Kendall. No announcement was made after the meeting of the committee as to the probability that the delegate convention would endorse a slate for the coming primary. Some members of the party had expected such action in compli ance with the recommendation of the last state convention. The resolution concerning President Coolidge read:





Half Billion U.S. Acres Untouched

Washington, Jan. 26 .- Government surveyors have yet to focus their in-struments on more than half a billion acres of the public domain, ac-cording to a report issued today by the interior department, and the potential wealth of this vast virgin acre-age may not be known for several core of years.

A total of 376.462,000 acres in Alas a and 151,106,769 acres in the western states remain unsurveyed, and it is estimated by the general land of fice that if an additional rate of 26,751 lineal miles, the area inspected in the west last year, is maintained, it will take more than 20 years to cover this territory alone. Because of exten sive, inaccessible regions in Alaska, no effort was made to predict when the surveys would be completed there. Of the unsurveyed acreage in the states, 56,026,912 are classed as vaant, unappropriated and unreserved public lands.

Huron Stockyards Burn.

Huron, S. D., Jan. 26 .- The Huron ards company stockyards here were completely destroyed by fire yesterday, entailing a loss to the yards and buildings of \$34,000, covered by inurance.

Between 700 and 800 hogs and arload of sheep were burned to death, all covered by insurance. The explosion of a stove in the office is aid to have caused the fire.

Omaha Doctor Launches 15-Cent Gasoline Drive; Urges Boycott of Fuel

A boycott on gasoline has been started in Omaha by Dr. Felix J. Despecher, 312 Omaha Loan and Building Association building, which he hopes to make a nation-wide movement. Several thousand but-tons with the inscription "Fifteen Cents" on them, will be put on sale by the doctor next week.

Any person who buys the buttons will be asked to take a pledge to use as little gasoline as possible until the price goes down to 15 cents, explained Dr. Despecher. "I heard that the price of gaso-

line was going up soon," he said. "so if everyone would wear these buttons the gasoline trust would soon be broken."
