

Code Revision Bill Introduced in Iowa Senate

Measure Would Eliminate Necessity of Calling Special Sessions of Legislature.

Des Moines, Ia., Jan. 29.—Elimination of the necessity of calling special sessions of the legislature to revise the state code is the purpose of a bill introduced at the afternoon session of the senate today by Sen-

ators Smith of Madison county and Shinn of Harrison. If passed, the measure also would save the state about \$100,000 each 25 years and at the same time provide an up-to-date code.
The plan is to have the complete code reprinted each four years, the latest editions to contain, in addition to the old laws, the statutes enacted by the two legislative sessions just prior to the reprinting of the code. Authorities of the bill estimate that \$100,000 would cover the cost of publishing the code.
The bill also would reduce by about half the number of code books distributed by the state free of charge. About 9,000 copies of the code now are available without cost to state and local officers. The measure was referred to the committee on code revisions.

Education Bill Passes.

Introduction of this bill and reporting out of six others by senate committees marked the extent of the afternoon session. The morning had been given over to passage of the state parks bill and one relating to the establishment of highways.
The house today passed one bill of importance, that relating to the board of education. The measure brought on a fight which continued all morning and which resulted in adoption of an amendment by Storey of Warren county, which practically abolishes the State Teachers' college's custom of sending practice teachers to the city schools of Mason City, Waterloo and also here for observation and training. The amendment provided that contracts between school districts and the state board of education for such practice teaching must be arranged "without expense to the state," which will mean, it was said, that the state would have to insist upon the payment of salaries to the teachers in training. This, none of the districts are inclined to do, according to representatives from the counties which will be affected.

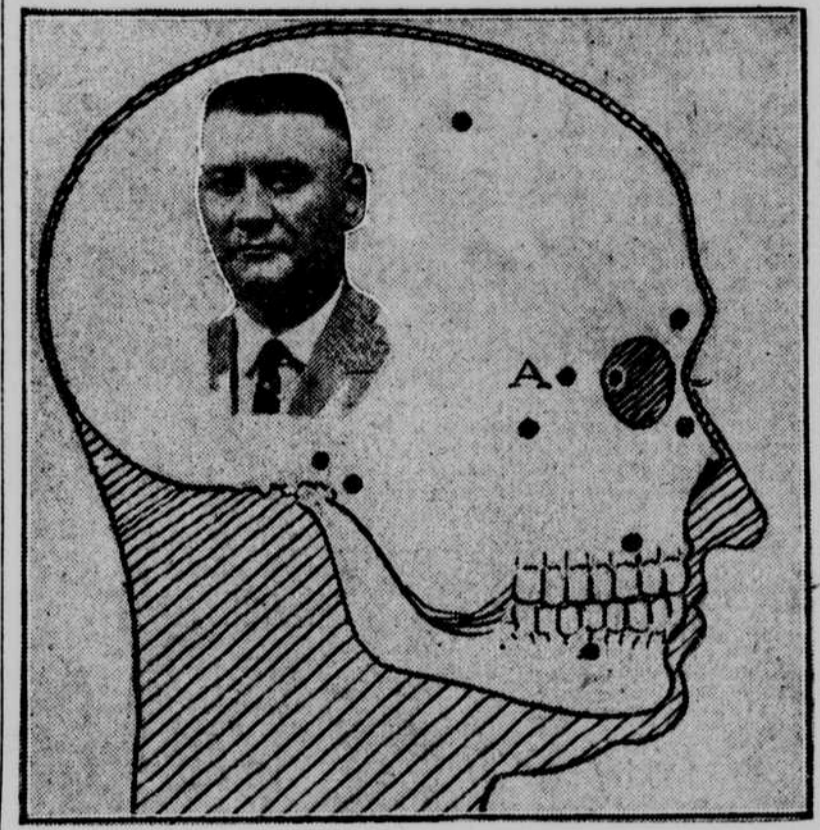
Resolution Defeated.

The house today defeated the Moon resolution, under which the house might have considered code commission bills assigned to the senate before the senate had passed them. The house opponents of the measure charged the senate was "afraid of several hot measures" and mustered 66 votes against the resolution to 22 for it. Its sponsors had argued that the house was ahead of the senate in business done and could expedite code revision by clearing its way to consider any code commission bill without regard to which house originally had received it.
Important measures in the house calendar tomorrow include the new fish and game bill, which is a special order.

Haze Will Carry Ounce of Lead, 10 Bullets, in Face Rest of Life



For the rest of his life, Detective Paul Haze will carry more than an ounce of lead in his face, approximately the weight of a silver dollar.
The diagram, drawn by The Omaha Bee artist, from an X-ray photograph of his skull, shows its distribution.
The lead is in the form of ten No. 6 buckshot, and became imbedded in the detective's flesh when he was shot by Cenek Hrabik at the Hrabik home near Gibson, Neb., a week ago.
One of the lead pellets entered the left side of the eyeball and penetrated to a point back of the eye socket, marked A, within a sixteenth of an inch of the optic nerve. Had the shot touched the nerve, the sight of the eye would have been lost. No effort will be made to remove the shot, for the reason that an operation would entail greater hazard to the eye than leaving the lead where it is.
One shot lodged above the eye, and the rest are indicated by black dots on the diagram.
Exact weight of all the pellets is one and one-sixteenth ounces.
Haze was reported to be recovering in Lord Lister hospital this morning.

Annex Needed at Anamosa Prison

Des Moines, Ia., Jan. 30.—The Anamosa reformatory is so crowded that about 100 prisoners are sleeping on cots in corridors and a new cell house must be erected within the next year, State Senator Hale of Jones county declared today, following an investigation of conditions at the institution.
The senator, along with members of the board of control, hopes that the extension required may be financed by the prison industries and believes this will be possible unless the legislature unexpectedly decides on a prison labor policy that would deprive the state of from \$5,000 to \$10,000 a month now received from that source.

Shenandoah, Ia., Jan. 29.—The body of Boyd Buntz, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Buntz, formerly of Shenandoah, who now live at Blythe, Cal., is being taken to Shenandoah for burial. The boy died Saturday of typhoid fever.
