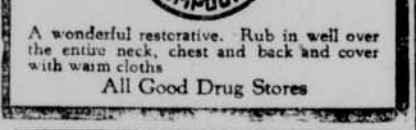


Doctor Chats Under Knife at Hospital

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The operation was performed under local anaesthesia only, by Dr. E. C. Henry, upon Dr. Antone Fehr, assistant surgeon at the hospital, who came to Omaha from Budapest, Hungary, a year ago.

Operation Painless. "With the application of novocaine I went through the operation without pain," Dr. Fehr said, "and talked to Dr. Henry during the operation, telling him just what he was doing and what instruments he used. I couldn't see the operation because of the curtain placed in front of the patient's face during any major operation."

By undergoing the operation in this way, nausea and post-operative pneumonia from the ether are avoided.

Patients Unfraid. "In Europe, more operations are performed under local anaesthesia than under general anaesthesia. The patients there are not frightened because they are told just what is to take place."

Dr. Fehr suffered pain only three hours after the operation, and expects to be out of bed in five days.

McDonald Wins French Favor

Makes Overtures to Paris to End Breach—Poincare Agreeable.

By International News Service. London, Jan. 30.—Premier Ramsay MacDonald, head of Great Britain's new labor government, has made overtures to France for new rules strengthening the entente cordiale.

The activities which the premier-foreign secretary is showing in settling home and foreign problems is astounding friends and enemies alike.

While finding time to deal with Russia and France, he is seeking to placate Ulster and the Irish Free State in their boundary dispute.

Premier Poincare immediately replied in a conciliatory tone opening the way for a conference.

The cabinet has not given up the idea of a general conference of European powers and the United States on war debts and reparations.

The premier evidently believes that France would be more likely to participate if the entente cordiale were renewed.

Wartime Plane Makers Playing

Washington, Jan. 30.—A demand in the house Tuesday for investigation of the army air service was followed by a statement by Secretary Weeks, showing that claims totaling \$3,253,134 against wartime airplane contractors already have been turned over to the Department of Justice for collection in the courts.

Up to January 28, he said, the refunds actually made by contractors amounted to \$1,520,423.

The investigation proposal was embodied in a resolution by Representative Nelson, republican, Wisconsin, who said he had been informed that conditions in the air service amounted to a continuation of the same conditions that obtained during the war.

The methods of the Manufacturers Aircraft Association, Inc., were declared by Mr. Nelson to be, in his opinion, in violation of the anti-trust law, but Mr. Weeks pointed out that in 1917 the attorney general ruled to the contrary.

Omahan Sues Klan Wizard

Edgar J. Fuller, giving his address as Omaha, has filed suit for \$12,000 in Kansas City against Edward Clute, former imperial wizard of the Ku Klux Klan, charging breach of contract.

Fuller was active in Omaha last year in anti-klan propaganda and in the organization of an American fascist movement.

Youth Thrown From Horse Dies From Broken Neck

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 29.—Raymond Pallen-Kingdom of Extra, Ga., died as the result of injuries received Saturday night when his horse fell and precipitated him head foremost to the ground. The youth's neck was broken. He lived several hours but never regained consciousness.

Fremont Pioneer Dies 10 Days After Death of Mate

Shenandoah, Ia., Jan. 29.—Mrs. Frances B. Gordon, pioneer in Fremont county, who had lived more than 40 years on one farm, died of pneumonia 10 days after the death of her husband, 76. Five grown children survive.

Crowell Indictment Jinked.

Washington, Jan. 28.—Holding that the indictment failed to show facts upon which the charges were made, Justice Hohling, in the district supreme court today, sustained the demurrers in the army cantonment conspiracy cases involving Benedict Crowell, assistant secretary of war in the Wilson administration, and six co-defendants.

A new indictment will have to be drawn or the case lapses.

Indicted with Crowell were William A. Starrett of New York, Morton C. Tuttle of Boston, Clemens W. Lundoff of Cleveland, Clair Foster of New York, John MacGibbons of Baltimore and Chicago and James A. Meira of Cleveland, all identified with contracting firms that built army cantonments.

The indictment charged that the defendants had deceived army engineers and had secured for their friends and assistants some \$50,000,000 worth of contracts under the cost-plus system without requiring competitive bids.

Swobe was called to the stand by T. J. McGuire, deputy attorney general, who is conducting an action for the state to have the Bricton company kept from operating in Nebraska and prevented from removing its assets from an Omaha bank.

If the action is successful more than \$100,000 will be returned to Nebraska stockholders, according to McGuire.
