

Parmeles Given to 3-Year Term

Former Cass County Bank Head Denied New Trial - Will Appeal.

By Associated Press. Plattsmouth, Neb., Feb. 8.—Charles O. Parmele, former head of the Cass County State bank, recently found guilty by a jury here on a charge of embezzlement, today was sentenced to serve from one to three years in the state penitentiary by Judge A. C. Troupe of Omaha, who came here especially to hear motion by counsel of the convicted banker for a new trial, which he subsequently overruled.

Attorneys for Parmele asked a new trial on the ground that some of the jurors, in affidavits, were of the opinion that the defendant was not given a fair trial. In overruling the motions, the judge criticized the attorneys for what he termed their antiquated methods of procedure.

Motions were made for a new trial for Carl G. Fricke, charged with falsifying the books of the Livingston Loan and Building association, which is now in the hands of a receiver. Fricke also was found guilty by the jury here.

Parmeles was remanded to jail pending the fixing of his appeal bond by the state supreme court at Lincoln. He gave notice of an appeal shortly after judgment was passed.

He was a son of William Steinmeyer, pioneer of Clatonia, and is survived by his wife and one child. He was a cousin of G. W. Steinmeyer, former representative from Gage county, and H. H. Steinmeyer of this city.

Beatrice—Business men to the number of about 50 tendered a banquet to William Kilpatrick, member of the firm of Kilpatrick Brothers, railroad contractors of this city, at the Paddock hotel, the occasion being his 71st birthday anniversary. E. M. Marvin was toastmaster and responses were made by S. F. Nichols, C. F. Dempster, Wallace Robertson, Judge Colby, A. L. Green and R. W. Grant.

Columbus—The estate left by former Register of Deeds Jarry Carrig was larger by \$7,000 than was expected, according to figures filed by County Clerk George H. Bender and Register of Deeds L. A. Lachnit.

Beatrice—John Gronewald, farmer living near Pickrel, trapped a gray fox at his farm, being the second he has caught in this city.

Beatrice—William Thomas, Sr., formerly head of the Thomas Bill Post-Office company in this city, is lying at the point of death at his home at Schuyler, according to word received here. Relatives from this city have been summoned to the bedside.

Falls City—One thousand persons from all corners of Richardson county are expected to attend the rally for adjusted compensation to be held here Sunday afternoon. Sam Reynolds of Omaha, former commander of Douglas county post No. 1, American Legion, will be the principal speaker.

Falls City—Ben C. Dale of Logan, Ia., formerly county engineer for Pottawattamie county, Iowa has been named for that position in Richardson county by the county board of commissioners, succeeding J. Frank Reif, who resigned when the new state statute fixing a salary limit of \$2,000 annually became operative.
