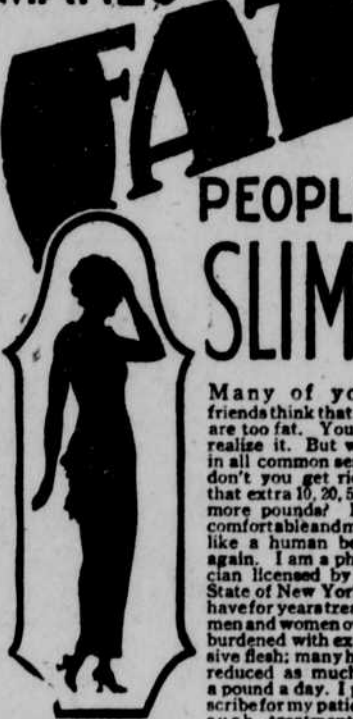

## Museum Notes.

The public library has placed on display a group of books on Chinese art and modern art for those interested in making a study of the subject while these exhibitions are to be seen in the galleries. Special attention is called to Roger Fry's chapter on Negro sculpture in "Vision and Design." The exhibition of antique sculpture has been extended to February 17.

On February 13, a large exhibition of American paintings from the Milch galleries will be opened to the public. The exhibition will be in charge of William Savitzky, who will give several gallery lectures while the collection is shown. There will be canvases by Childe Hassam, George Bellows, Eugene Speicher, Thomas Eakins, Ernest Lawson, Richard Miller, Hayley Lever, J. Francis Murphy, Henry Golden Dearth, Frederick Frei-

seke, Emil Carlsen, Bruce Crane, Willard Metcalf, Gifford Beal, William Glackens, Jonas Lie, Abbott Thayer, Chauncey Ryder, William Ritschel, Sigurd Schou, Robert Henri, Edmund Greacen, Leon Gaspard, and others.

The American director of the Royal academy at Munich, Carl Maar, with seven other professors, will no longer hold positions there. Maar was born in Milwaukee in 1858 and has been connected with the academy since 1915. The government under the new gold standard is cutting down the payroll to the minimum, giving age as the reason for the removal of these seven men, who are all over 65.

Arthur B. Davies, represented in the modern art exhibition at the library, will hold a comprehensive exhibition of his work at Carnegie Institute, Pittsburgh, in the near future.
