

Rites Held for Bridge Builder

Hood, 85, veteran of the civil war, who died Saturday at his home, 2737 Caldwell street, were held Tuesday morning at the Johnson & Swanson funeral chapel. Rev. Charles W. Savidge, who officiated, lauded the work of Mr.

Hood in the pioneer days of Omaha as a bridge builder. Mr. Hood was one of the builders of the Douglas street bridge. He was born in Virginia in 1838. In August, 1861, Mr. Hood entered the

civil war as lieutenant and was made a major in 1865. He came to Council Bluffs soon after the war and later married to Omaha. Six years ago he owned an Omaha woman who owned a number of oil leases in Oklahoma.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Hood were reported to be wealthy.

Friday in Omaha, were held yesterday afternoon at the chapel in Forest Lawn cemetery. The body later was cremated.

John H. Killian was in charge. An eulogy of Mr. Watson, prepared by W. R. Watson, was read by George F. West, acting esteemed royal knight.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon at 2 at Brewer's chapel. Burial will be Laurel Hill cemetery.

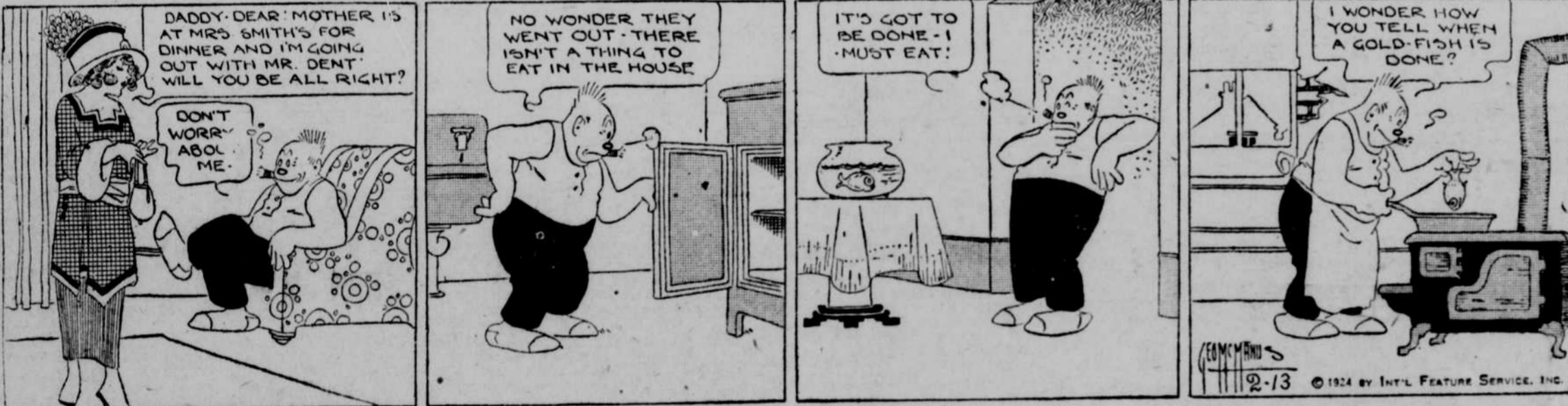
