"He Gave is Life for His Country"

Hughes Speaks Harding Eulogy as Cabinet and Congress Honor Memory.

By International News Service. Washington, Feb. 27.—"He wore himself in the endeavor to be friendly. He gave his life to his country. No one can do more than that." This final tribute to Warren G. Harding, the man and the president, was spoken today by Secretary of State Charles E. Hughes, who delivered the only address at the official memorial services for the late president in the hall of the house of representatives.

stilled, a distinguished audience foregathered in the house to testify to the esteem in which the late president was held, and to note his sorrowful passing. Present there on the floor were President Coolidge, his successor, members of the cabinet and members of the supreme court; the diplomatic colony of Washington; representatives of congress; a saddened group of relatives and intimate personal friends of Mr. Harding. His widow sat in this group, clad in the somber black of bereavement.

Few More Eulogized. Few of the departed presidents have been more eulogized than was Mr. Harding in the address of his secretary of state. He reviewed at length the accomplishments of his administration of the republic, but it was upon the humanness and kindness of the late president that he laid greatest stress. "It is fitting," said Secretary Hughes, "that we should render the official tribute of respect but the

significance of this occasion is far deeper than that. "It is the tribute inspired by love of country as laying aside the differences and controversies which seem but trivial in the face of man's adventures and God's providence, we stand united by the indissoluble bond of a common patriotism, knowing well that ungrateful republics cannot endure. The temples of democracy will be but vain vestiges of a vanished faith if their altar fires are not kept burning by the memory of those who have met the stern test and have laid their lives in heroic fidelity and self-sacrificing.

Tribute of Affection. "Above all, we give the tribute of deep affection, which moves us to speak in tender remembrance of a gracious and kindly spirit who counted human fellowship more precious than all the pomp and circumstance of power. "He belonged to the aristocracy of the plain people of this country. "He exhausted himself in service,

a martyr in fidelity to the interests of the people for whom he labored with a passionate devotion. He was a man of the people, indulging no consciousness of superiority, incapable of superiority, incapable of arrogance, separated from them neither by experience nor pride nor by eccentricity. Nothing human was alien to him and he had the divine gift of sympathy. He wrought mightily for the prosperity of the nation and the peace of the world, but he clothed the exercise of power with a beautiful garment of gentleness. "Exemplar in High Offices. "If American life with all its possibilities of conflict and turmoil is to be worth doing, it must be lived in the spirit of brotherly understanding of which he will ever be an exemplar in high offices. "High praise for the manner in which Mr. Harding conducted his newspaper, the Marion Star, was also voiced by Secretary Hughes. He read Warren Harding's "newspaper code" and then said "he was the great heart of newspaperdom."

Brown, Lundin Win at Seattle

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 27.—Mayor Edwin J. Brown and Alfred H. Lundin were nominated as majority candidates in the primary election held here yesterday, according to complete unofficial returns from all of the city's 254 precincts. Mayor Brown polled a plurality of 4,551 votes over Lundin. The unofficial returns tabulated from the 254 precincts gave: Brown, 27,592; Lundin, 23,041; Erickson, 17,344.
