Man Kills Self After Attempt to Slay Family

Hickman Oil Agent Probably Fatally Wounds Wife With Ax-Phoots Children Through Mouth.

Feb. 29.-Arthur G. Lincoln. Ewerth, 40, oil agent at Hickman, 15 miles south of here, this morning struck his wife several times with an ax and probably fatally wounded her, shot his two children, Arlin, 12, and Irene, 10, and then shot and killed himself.

It was thought at first that he had shot his wife, but a bloodstain was found on an ax which was discovered in-the garage later.

At the hospital here it was said Mrs. Ewerth had a chance to live. The two children, who were shot through their mouths with a .22 caliber rifle, were said to have been badly wounded, but not in immediate danger.

Ewerth shot himself in the stom ach with a shotgun, and death apparently was instantaneous. The sheriff's office here sent mer to Hickman to investigate the shoot


