Women's Missionary Federation Observes Day of Prayer

Rev. Ada Stone Anderson of Hillside Congregational church was re-elected president of the Women's Missionary Federation at the business meeting which formed part of the day of prayer for missions observed yesterday at the First Christian church. More than 200 women, representing nine denominations and 41 different church societies, together with the W. C. T. U., the Y. W. C. A. and the City Mission, which are affiliated members of the federation, took part in the observance.

Other officers elected are Mrs. D. E. Jenkins, vice president; Mrs. Ed H. Gilbe, recording secretary; Mrs. L. A.

Hornburg, corresponding secretary; and Mrs. L. A. Thompson, treasurer. Secretaries for special departments include Mrs. O. C. Uhlig, secretary for temperance; Mrs. Carrie Ada Campbell, Y. W. C. A. secretary; Mrs. C. H. Hinkhouse, secretary of missions; Mrs. A. D. Cloyd, secretary social welfare.

A gift of \$50 out of the surplus funds of the federation was voted to be given toward rebuilding the Y. W. C. A. building at Tokio, destroyed by the earthquake.

Mrs. Josephine Van Pearsen, a 78-year-old missionary, who spent 12 years at Muscat, Arabia, was the principal speaker of the afternoon session, addressing the federation on the subject, "What It Means to Be a Missionary Woman." She prefaced her speech with a little plea for the international point of view cultivated by missions, adding that she is a typical example, as she is a Swiss girl, who married an American, in Baghdad, Mrs. Pearsen did not appear in Arabian costume as she had planned.

"Seventy-five per cent of all the children whose births I heard about, while I was in Arabia, died before reaching the end of their third year," declared Mrs. Van Pearsen, who kept record on the children who came under her observation during her stay in that country. This extremely high death rate, she continued, is characteristic of Moslem lands, and is partly due to the superstitions of the people.

An expectant mother, pursued the speaker, is forced to sleep on a bag of sand in the meanest room in the house, and must dress in dirty rags. This is in order to disguise her from evil spirits, who are believed to have power over her at this time. In addition she must fast and what in a desert climate amounts to torture.

"Trend of Popular Music is More Degrading than Uplifting," was a feature of the Women's club meeting, which attracted as many visitors as members, at an open meeting held at the home of Mrs. R. H. Goodge. The judges decided the debate in favor of the affirmative.

she must go without water for 10 days. Such harsh treatment, said the missionary, is one of the reasons why so many Arabian women die in childbirth or contract terrible fevers. When the child is born, it is streaked with charcoal and ochre to make it look ugly and uncared for so that the evil spirits who have power over it during the first two years of its life may not think it worth killing. If the child is a boy and so specially precious, he is hidden in a cradle under a heavy black cloth, under which he is sometimes kept half smothered for as long as seven months. These methods of protection result in a death rate which give a certain amount of color to the legends of the evil spirits and their power.
