People May Have Gone Too Far in Regulation, Says H. G. Taylor.

H. G. Taylor, for 12 years a mem-ber of the Nebraska state railway commission and candidate for re-elec tion as a republican, was the speaker at the weekly dinner of the Rotarians here yesterday.

Mr. Taylor, a student of transportation affairs, spoke on the growth of transportation, the interdependence between the railroads and the farms ers, and the needs of the transportation systems if they are to keep pace with the development of the coun-

"Had it not been for the develop-ment of the locomotive and the building of railroads far ahead of the development of the country itself, this republic might yet be confined to a fringe of states on the two sea-coasts," he said. "It is possible, too, that the whole interior of the republic might now be under the control of European powers.

"The development of steam trans-portation was so rapid, and the settling up of the country so tremen dous, that it was only natural that an era of wild speculation, of graft and of high financing took place. Then came the time when an outraged people demanded and secured restrictive laws, and in their resentment they may have gone too far in that direction.

"The tendency is now, I believe for the pendulum to swing back, not to the extremes of the old days, of course, but back to that happy medium where the transportation managers and the great mass of producers shall sit at a common table, put their cards in plain sight and afwill spell prosperity for all the peo- Chicago.


