Captain Edwards is the holder of

the Jordan medal which signifies that he has the record for the longest continuous service in Masonic work in Nebraska.

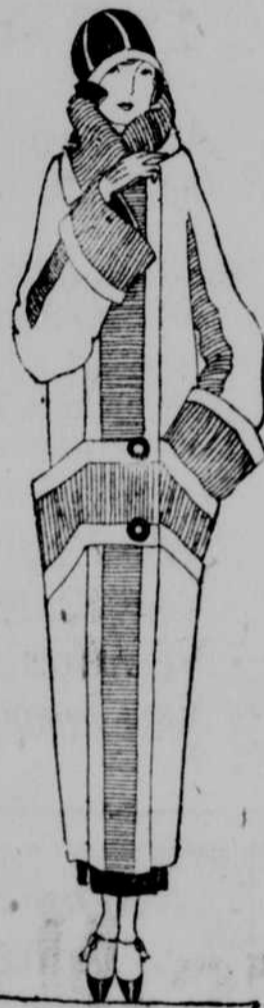
