

Mother of 3 Woos Death in Bathroom

Despondent Over Death of First Mate and Divorce of Second; Sister Frustrates Attempt.

Locking herself in the bathroom while a party was in progress downstairs, Mrs. Grace Berry, 26, 2865 Pinkney street, attempted suicide early Thursday morning by inhaling an anaesthetic.

Two Other Attempts. Relatives said that she has attempted suicide twice before, stating that she did not care to live following her marital troubles.

According to relatives, Mrs. Berry had been despondent over the death of her first husband and the divorce of her second husband.

Upon entering the bath room, she is said to have saturated cotton with an anaesthetic which she held to her nostrils after having covered herself with a blanket.

At the time, it was alleged that she did not care to live following her marital troubles. After being revived she was left at home in the care of her sister and a brother, Mark Poland.

Mrs. Berry first attempted suicide December 2, 1923, when she locked her three children in the front part of her home and tried to asphyxiate herself in the kitchen.

A note had been left to Frank Van Kampen begging him "don't leave me at the undertaker's, take me home. I am going to John." John was her first husband.

Second Mate Left. At the time, it was alleged that she did not care to live following her marital troubles. After being revived she was left at home in the care of her sister and a brother, Mark Poland.

She said Frank left her Thanksgiving day, saying he would not return. About 60 days later he did return, it is said, and Mrs. Berry had him arrested after he had abused her and started wrecking household furnishings.

Mrs. Berry was proprietor of the Fort cafe at Thirtieth and Fort streets. The children are Katherine, 8; Betty, 4, and Edith, 2.

Washington, April 3.—Chairman George Norris of the senate agricultural committee, which will decide next Tuesday whether to hold public hearings on the Fort Muscle Shoals bid, hopes to make Muscle Shoals a vehicle for the declaration of a general policy by the federal government in water power development.

Both the Boulder canyon dam on the Colorado river and the Muscle Shoals problems in the opinion of Chairman Norris require the adoption of a policy of federal ownership and operation.
