

Third Party Will Carry West, Says Governor Preus

Coolidge Campaign Manager, However, Declares President Sure of 620 Delegates by April 22.

Washington, April 4.—The word that a third party, or independent political movement, headed by Senator La Follette, has captured a large number of western states was brought to President Coolidge today by Governor J. A. O. Preus, republican, Minnesota.

While the statement created a sensation in both democratic and republican quarters, it does not, of course, affect the re-convention campaign so far as the president is concerned.

Just before Governor Preus was received by the president, William M. Butler, campaign manager, issued a public statement declaring that Coolidge has 385 delegates now pledged and by April 22 will have a total of 620. Only 555 are needed to nominate.

Face Real Menace. But when the smoke of the June convention has cleared away, both the republican and the democratic candidates will face a real menace, Governor Preus declared.

"The third party movement is strong, very strong," he said.

"If Senator La Follette lives, he will carry Minnesota, Wisconsin, North and South Dakota, Montana, Nebraska, Colorado and perhaps Iowa. He will carry these states against the combined opposition of the democrats and the republicans. And the movement is rapidly spreading.

May Be Up to Congress. Governor Preus said that the only thing which can stop the La Follette movement is the senator himself. He is now recovering from an attack of pneumonia.

As the situation now stands, it was stated, there is the possibility that neither nominee of the major political parties will secure enough votes to go into the electoral college, and that the entire situation may be thrown into congress for the selection of a president. Here again the progressive block, it is feared, will be able to force a deadlock between the democrats and republicans, as they have in legislative matters so far.

Freight Rate Change Urged

Clara H. Gorman Willing to Give Oil Testimony

Woman Figuring in Death of Jake Hamon Will "Tell All She Knows" If Called by Senate.

Los Angeles, Cal., April 4.—If Mrs. John W. Gorman, better known to the public as Clara Smith Hamon, who played an important part in the life and death of the late Jake Hamon, political power and former republican national committeeman from Oklahoma, is called by the senate oil investigating committee, she will "tell all she knows" concerning the political activities of Hamon.

What she knows, however, she declined to discuss except to declare it "was not much." The now Mrs. Gorman is not talking for publication these days. Since her marriage she has been living a quiet life away from public attention, dividing her time between her secluded home in Beverly Hills and a ranch near Van Nuys, about 25 miles from Los Angeles.

"If I am called by the senate committee, I will gladly tell what I know, but that little is not much," she told International News Service, refusing to elaborate on the statement.

"I am so happily married now and am living a very quiet life, trying to forget some of those unpleasant things of the past," she explained. "That is why I do not care to talk unless it is absolutely necessary."

Mrs. Gorman declined to discuss testimony given by Al Jennings and others before the senate committee to the effect that Hamon had cabinet aspirations and had expended large sums in connection with the last republican presidential nomination. She reiterated that if called by the committee "it would be plenty of time to talk."

Extension of Three Per Cent Quota Proposed

Representative Would Have Present Immigration Law in Force Until 1926—Urges Inquiry.

Washington, April 4.—On the eve of house consideration of the Johnson immigration bill, Representative Sabath, democrat, Illinois, introduced a resolution proposing legislation to extend the present 3 per cent quota law, based on the 1910 census, to December 31, 1925, and creation of a commission to study the immigration problem. The existing law automatically expires June 30 next.

The commission suggested by Mr. Sabath, who is one of the members of the house immigration committee opposed to the bill sponsored by Chairman Johnson, would be composed of two senators, two members of the house, and three others to be appointed by the president as representatives of industrial, labor and agricultural interests.

The Johnson bill, which would fix immigration quotas at 2 per cent based on the 1890 census, would provide for overseas examination of prospective immigrants and practical

bar Japanese from entry into the United States, will come up in the house tomorrow.
