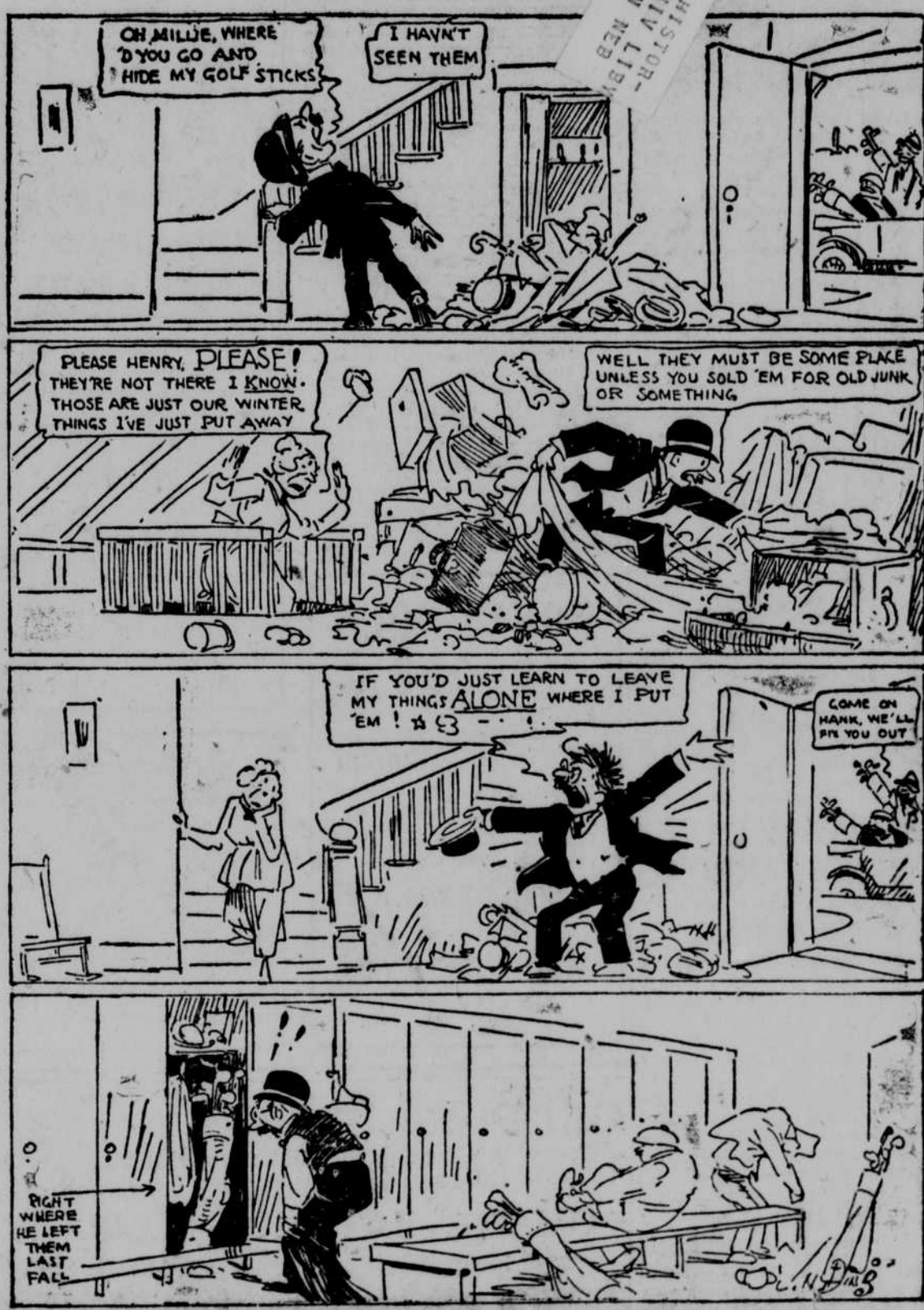
TWO AMERICANS SLAIN IN ITALY

U. S. Fliers Reach Prince Rupert on Round-World Trip

Three of Four Planes Arrive at Canadian Point After Encountering Heavy Mist and Rain. Prince Rupert, B. C., April 6.—Three planes of the U. S. army on a flight around the world arrived here at 4:54 this afternoon.

By Associated Press. Seattle, April 6.—Four planes of the United States army that left Santa Monica, Cal., March 17 on a flight around the world and arrived here March 20, left the States today.

Three of them departed from here just before 9 this morning and the other an hour later. At 1:20 p. m., the first three were reported passing over Egeg Island, about half way to Prince Rupert, B. C., where the squadron expected to drop down into Seal Cove at 7 tonight to rest before the next stage, to Sitka, Alaska.

Encounter Mist. Along the north coast of Vancouver Island, the planes reports forwarded here by the Canadian Press showed, encountered thick mist and rain, with a southeast breeze at their backs.

Two Killed, Score Hurt in Klan Riot

Hose Turned on Klansmen Boarding Train After Parade at Lilly, Pa.—Gun Battle Follows. Lilly, Pa., April 6.—Two men were killed, another believed fatally wounded and a score of others were more or less seriously hurt in rioting Saturday night between townspeople and members of the Ku Klux Klan, a close checkup by state police and deputy sheriffs disclosed today.

29 Held by Authorities

Lilly, Pa., April 6.—Two men were held, another believed fatally wounded and a score of others were more or less seriously hurt in rioting Saturday night between townspeople and members of the Ku Klux Klan, a close checkup by state police and deputy sheriffs disclosed today. Four residents of Lilly were being held by state police upon charges of rioting, while at Johnstown 25 men, said to be klansmen, were being held by Sheriff Logan N. Keller pending investigation.

Town Patrolled.

Sheriff Keller with a force of deputies and a detachment of state police, patrolled the town today. Sheriff Keller returned to Johnstown later in the day, declaring he feared no further disorders. Members of the state police remained, however, to conduct an investigation.

All but a group of about 100 klansmen had boarded the train when the firing began. The loading of the train continued as bullets whizzed through the air and stones and other missiles were hurled from all directions. The train departed as soon as the visiting klansmen had entered the cars. When it arrived at Johnstown it was met by Sheriff Keller and Chief of police Brimey. Klansmen remaining on the train were searched and 25 men with pistols were arrested, according to Sheriff Keller. He declared that any charge to be made against them would be preferred after the investigation.

LIQUOR AGENTS CAPTURE SHIPS

New York, April 6.—Prohibition agents in this district, working on land and sea, yesterday arrested 18 men, captured a steam yacht, a schooner, a motor boat and four trucks, and seized 2,635 cases of liquor.

Chicago Gangsters Keep Truce for Funeral of Slain Gunman

Feuds, Individual and Collective, Laid Aside as Sworn Enemies in Underworld Pass Side by Side to Bier of Man Slain in Election Riots. Chicago, April 6.—There was a truce yesterday among Chicago's warring gunmen, beer runners, hijackers, bootleggers, panders and detectives while an imposing requiem for the death was being said over all that was mortal of Frank Caponi, shot down in the sensational Cicero election riots last Tuesday.

It was a truce that held from the time the notorious gunman's body was carried from the morgue Friday to lie in state, and it was all of that, at his home. Feuds, individual and collective, for the nonce were laid aside as sworn enemies in Chicago's seething underworld worked their way side by side, through great crowds and into the room, whose walls were banked with \$20,000 worth of floral pieces. It took 20 automobiles to convey these flowers from house to cemetery. There were 500 automobiles—and none of your low-priced cars—in line behind the costliest motor hearse in the city. The line was two miles long.

Large Gifts to Parties Flayed by Idaho Senator

Corruption Will Exist as Long as Contributions Are Made to Political Organizations, Says Borah. Washington, April 6.—So long as political parties seeking control of the government accept vast contributions from those interested in matters of legislation or administration, there will be sinister and corrupt and controlled government, Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, declared in an address before the students' law enforcement convention.

Germany's Hopes of Reparations Relief Smashed

Word of Burdens Imposed by Dawes' Experts Lends Apprehension to Nation as it Awaits Report. Berlin, April 6.—Germany awaits the publication of the decision of the Dawes expert commission in the mood of one about to be sentenced. It is generally realized that this is the last chance to clear up the European mess, and that also the decision will either make or break Germany itself.

One Ray of Hope. Only one ray of hope remains and that is that the decisions themselves may not prove as bad as heralded. However, a large section of political opinion here believes that Germany is willing to discuss any possible solution on the basis of the report of the experts while some believe that Germany will accept the report for the simple reason that it can do nothing else.

There is no doubt that Germany has become very modest in its expectations following the failure of active and passive resistance against the crushing force of France. The present government has shown genuine efforts to clear up the mess with in Germany itself and get on its feet. It is known that high government officials, including Foreign Minister Stresemann, while disappointed at the economic burdens and particularly by the payments imposed during the moratorium which they hold will make the moratorium illusory, nevertheless believe that an agreement regarding economic features is possible.

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Stabilizing of Currency to Be Sought

Report, According to Semi-Official Summary, Recommends Placing of Reparations in New Bank. Paris, April 6.—The following semi-official summary of the report of the Dawes committee of experts was obtained from the highest sources here tonight. It reveals that the whole scheme is based on the relinquishment by France and Belgium of the whole system for the collection of reparations which has been built up in the Ruhr and Rhineland.

Railways to Be Returned

Not only the railways must be returned to Germany, but the tax receipts and other monies now collected by the Franco-Belgians must go into a special department of a new bank created to bring sanity to Germany's money.
