By W. M. MAUPIN. Norfolk, Neb., April 6 .- More cle ments are mixing into the present primary campaign that ever before entered into a primary campaign in Nebraska. The most active element, it a parody be permitted, is the ac-tivity of General Apathy. The atti-tude of "O, what's the use" was never so general, and men who have heretofore been active, and who never before refused to express an opinion are inactive and wholly at sea.


