

# No Enthusiasm Over Election

## General Apathy Prevails in Rural Districts; Politicians Worried.

O'Neill, Neb., April 7.—The Saturday before election Tuesday, which in the rural districts always marks the closing of political campaigns since the passing of the old wet days, was more quiet in north Nebraska today than it has been for many years. Although the streets were thronged with farmers and ranchmen because the fields are set too wet to work, there was absolutely nothing from which a stranger might gather that candidates for national, state and county offices were to be nominated at the primary election Tuesday. Both town and country folk cast hopeful eyes at the fairly clear skies and expressed the wish that Sunday would be a clear and pleasant day for crow hunting, fishing or golf, and that the rather brisk breeze would continue to so dry out the ground that plowing could begin next Monday. If said wind does continue to do its duty, it apparently is a safe bet that in very many country precincts on Tuesday about the only ballots to be cast will be those of the members of the election boards. No one seems to be particularly teamed up over Teapot Dome or the merits of any special candidate in either of the major parties. Even the Nonpartisan leaguers refused to engage in heated arguments among themselves or with others. Politicians admit they are baffled and that they are unable to determine whether or not the apparent general apathy means that the voters have their minds made up or that they just don't give a darn.

## MAIL BANDITS GET \$20,000 IN BONDS

San Francisco, April 7.—Two unmasked bandits today obtained eight pouches of registered mail from a mail truck after forcing the driver and an armed guard to a place where they could make an easy escape in the heavy traffic. The pouches were transferred to an automobile while one of the bandits held a pistol at the guard's side.

Postal authorities said the principal loss was \$20,000 in bonds.

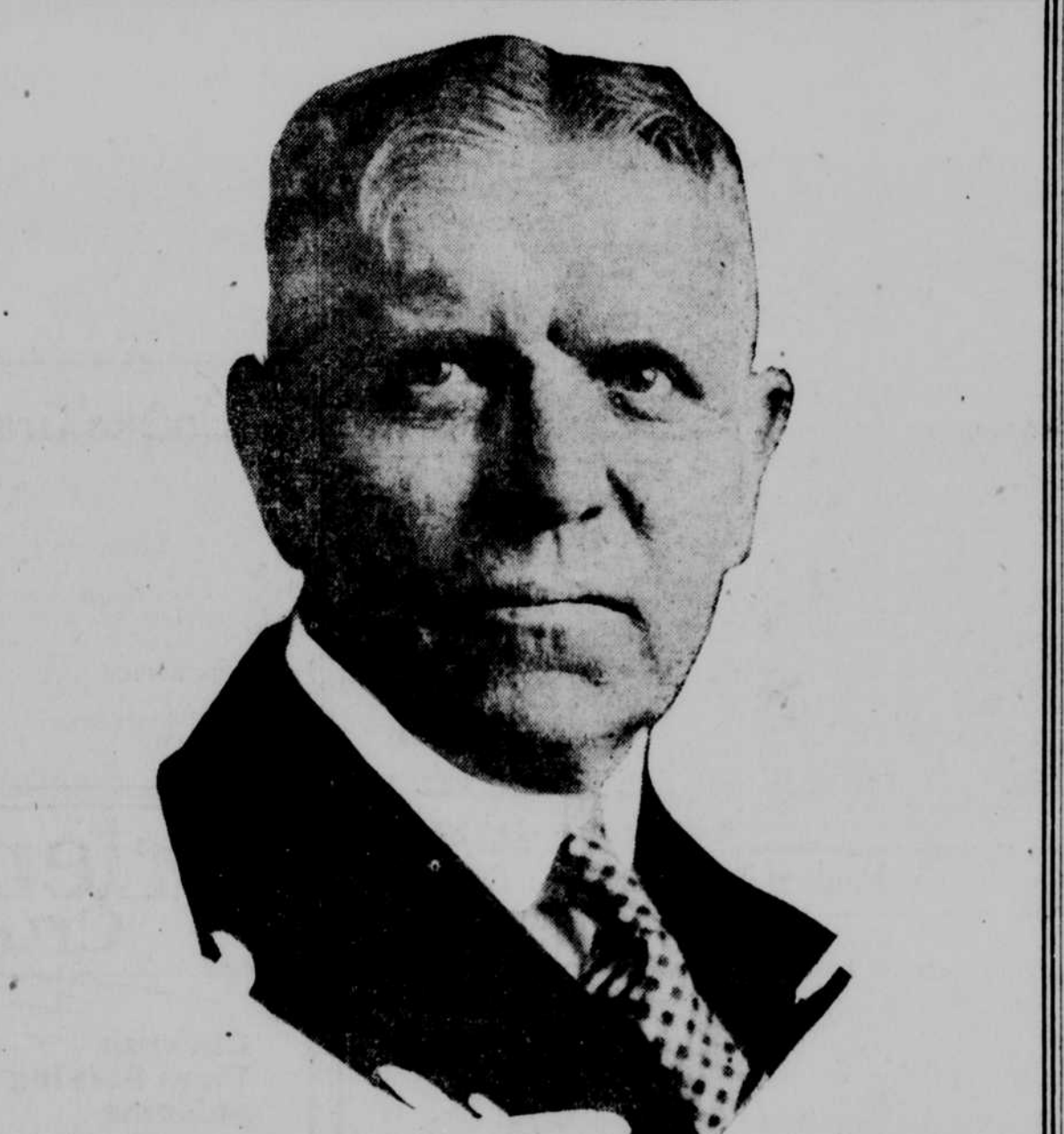
