Guide Rock, Neb., April 14.—When Burlington passenger train No. 17, Kansas City to Denver, rounded a curve near here last evening the engineer sighted three cows loosely grazing in the center of the track on a bridge approach. The brakes squeaked and Engineer Marshall, of Wymore, stopped the train as quickly as possible. The cows ran to the center of the high bridge and stopped.
