

Full Military Rites for Cirian

Omahans From All Walks of Life Honor Newsboy at Funeral.

"Taps" were sounded for Joe Cirian Wednesday afternoon. "Butts" Cirian, Omaha newsboy, who was gassed in the great war, was paid a high tribute by his friends. Men and women from all walks of life attended his funeral services in the church of St. Anne. There were those that bought papers from Cirian. There were others that knew him for his kindness.

Cirian died after a long struggle. For more than a year he fought tuberculosis, but the government had forgotten his performances on the battlefields of France.

Then his friends saw his plight, and knowing how it took money to nurse him back to health, they began to tear the red tape that stretched from Washington to the hospitals in Arizona and Omaha. The tape finally broke and his compensation money arrived too late.

Father Michael Stagno who knew Cirian all his life in Omaha, preached a sermon after the regular Catholic services. For his text Father Stagno took Christ's suggestion, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

"No greater love can any man show than he who lay down his life for his fellow man, as Joe did during the great war," said Father Stagno. "The sacrifice these men made in the war was almost as sublime as Christ made on the cross."

"During the war we encouraged the boys as they paraded off to the

front. We cheered them. We told them we were back of them.

"The way over, they returned many days each wounded, many with no show in gas. They expected at least a little sympathy. But we forgot them. They came to the churches and American Legion for help. We did the best we could for them. They came in us and said, 'Father, where are your promises?' What could we say?"

"Why, just recently I went to the county hospital to see Joseph. I asked him how he felt."

"Joe replied, 'Father, I am fairly well. But my fight is over.' I then asked him if there was any bitterness in his heart, and he replied: 'I am only sorry they made such a mistake. I only hope other men will hold no ill will toward the government.'

"On his deathbed, Joe said, 'Father, I am going to my last resting place. Give me the basket before it was placed in the vault. The angels in heaven. I hope in the future the government will take care of its own. Let us try to emulate such a spirit as was shown by our departed friend.'

"F. A. Carlson sang, 'Valle,' at the church. A firing squad composed of eight men and a bugler of the Seventeenth Infantry of Fort Omaha, in charge of Sgt. F. A. Long fired a volley across the basket before it was placed in the vault. The American Legion was represented by Leo Borell, commander; Harry Hough, adjutant; St. Wheeler, post liaison officer; J. M. Buck placed a gold star on the casket while the war mothers placed a wreath on it.

Tom Dennison, all the city commissioners except Dan B. Butler, and employees of both the city hall and courthouse attended.

Burial services were newsboy friends of Cirian.

Beatrice—S. L. Littell, 54, died at his home here after a brief illness. He was formerly located on a ranch in western Nebraska.

McAdoo Manager Cites Nebraska

Declares Primary Result Stamps His Man as "Natural Leader."

Chicago, April 16.—A declaration that the recent Nebraska primary election marked William G. McAdoo as "the natural leader of the progressive forces of the democratic party," was made today in a statement issued at McAdoo's national headquarters under the name of David Ladd Rockwell, national manager of the campaign.

"There was no candidate for the democratic presidential nomination filed in Nebraska. The McAdoo forces made absolutely no effort for a writ-

ing in of Mr. McAdoo's name, yet the results in 485 out of 1,400 precincts gave 5,877 votes for McAdoo, against 431 for Henry Ford and 413 for Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York. The proportion ran about the same throughout the state.

"The significant thing was that in each instance the voter had not only to write in the name of the candidate, but in place a voting cross beside the name. 'This requirement confused many voters and resulted in many improperly marked ballots.'

Beatrice, Neb., April 14.—Mrs. Mary C. Lynch has petitioned the district court here to grant her a divorce from James Lynch, which would terminate 34 years of married life. Charging cruelty and nonsupport, she asks the custody of Leonard, 16, who is the only minor among four children.

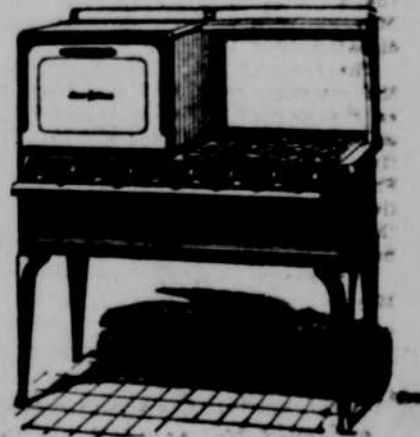
