Tuesday afternoon, April 29, will be devoted to registration and assignment and an auto ride by courtesy of Alliance Chamber of Commerce. The formal opening of the convention will occur that evening, including welcome, etc., and a musical program by the Junior High school pupils and other local talent, under the direction of Mrs. Inice Dunning, supervisor of music. The afternoon of the second day will be given to club reports.

Rouse of Scottsbluff, formerly head of the Peru Normal and one of the best known educators of Nebraska, will speak on "School Costs."

A banquet will be served at 6:30 Thursday evening to all delegates by courtesy of Alliance Woman's club. As this is election year, the presidents of clubs in attendance will act as a nominating committee, according to custom, and the election will conform as nearly as possible in method to that of the state convention.
